IX. APPOINTMENT ITEMS

Dewayne Cain

Rockwall, TX

- 1. Appointment with Dewayne Cain to discuss amending the Unified Development Code (UDC) to allow accessory buildings in an Agricultural (AG) District, and take any action necessary.
- Mr. Cain came forth and addressed the Council regarding this agenda item. He explained that he is the owner of Resthaven Memorial Park and that he owns about 200 acres of agriculturally zoned land. He hired an architect to design an elaborate barn / storage type facility that would be placed close to one of the homes he owns on Cornelius Road. He explained that his property was annexed into the city several years ago. In addition to Mr. Cain having hired an architect and having plans drawn up, a deposit was put down, a general contractor was hired, dirt work was done, and lime injection was performed. When the contractor came to the city to take out a building permit, he was told by staff that an SUP would be required before a permit could be issued. In the meantime, the city council made changes that disallowed an SUP to be requested. He went on to explain that a barn / accessory building is not currently allowed within an agriculturally zoned district, so there is no longer a means by which he is able to apply for a "specific use permit" (SUP). He is

coming before the Council this evening to see if there is a way to work something out such that he would be allowed to build this large accessory building on his agriculturally zoned property.

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided clarifying comments to the Council concerning this matter. He generally explained that currently, there is no SUP process by which a property owner may request to approve a 'barn' type accessory structure on "agriculturally zoned" land, and there is also not a means by which an owner may build 'private guest quarters.' It was generally explained that the "agriculture" zoning designation is assigned to newly annexed land "by default" (essentially), and it is the most restrictive zoning designation within the city's regulations. It exists this way as a means by which annexed land will be eventually pushed into a different zoning land designation; however, it unfortunately has an (unintended) adverse effect on (larger parcels of) land that truly are more 'agricultural' in nature. One change that would need to occur is for SUPs to be able to be requested, on a case-by-case basis, for "guest quarters" which are proposed to be built on 'agriculturally zoned' land. Right now, no SUP process exists to potentially allow those types of structures.

Mr. Cain clarified that "guest quarters" is a little more elaborate than what he is wanting to build. He essentially wants to build a (large) "man cave" to have folks over and watch sports games and store some of his car collection.

Following extensive discussion, the Council generally expressed a desire for staff to bring back some options for the council to consider relative to making some changes to the UDC to allow requests (by SUP) for accessory buildings (both ones to be utilized as 'barns' and ones to be utilized for 'private guest quarters'), on a case-by-case basis, on agriculturally zoned land.

Council took no formal action related to this agenda item at this time.

X. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. Z2018-049 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Mike Peoples for the approval of an ordinance for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for an animal shelter on a 42.66-acre tract of land identified as Tract 7 of the D. Harr Survey, Abstract No. 102, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Agricultural (AG) District, situated within the East SH-66 Overlay (E. SH-66 OV) District, addressed as 1700 E. SH-66, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Director, Ryan Miller, provided background information pertaining to this agenda item, indicating that back on December 17, 2018, the City Council continued the public hearing for Case No. Z2018-049 by a vote of 7 to 0. This case involved a request for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) that would allow for an animal shelter on the property. The purpose of the City Council's motion was to allow the applicant, Mike Peoples, additional time to prepare a schedule that outlined [1] the completion time for the animal shelter (which is currently partially constructed), and [2] the time needed to demolish the structure situated within the floodplain (which was constructed without a building permit). In response to the City Council's action, Mr. Peoples provided staff with a letter indicating that, weather permitting, he intends to complete the construction of the animal shelter by April 2019; however, Mr. Peoples has not indicated a timeframe for the demolition of the structure within the floodplain (see Exhibit 'B'). It should also be noted that staff requested that Mr. Peoples provide a timeframe for the demolition of the detached garage that was denied by the City Council on December 17, 2018; however, the letter submitted by Mr. Peoples indicates that he does not have a timeframe for the removal of this building either. Due to the applicant's in ability to provide staff with a

reasonable timeframe for the demolition of the two (2) unpermitted structures, staff has amended the draft ordinance for the animal shelter to require that both structures be removed from the property within six (6) months of the adoption date of the proposed Specific Use Permit (SUP) ordinance.

Councilmember Hohenshelt and Mayor Pruitt both indicated that their preference is to require that Mr. People demolish the existing structure (in the floodplain) prior to finishing the newest structure he wanting to complete.

Mr. Miller shared that Mr. Peoples has continued to work on the existing (unpermitted, unauthorized "animal shelter") structure during the time he has been going through the process associated with seeking formal approval of it being built. It was pointed out that when Mr. Peoples spoke to staff about the (currently under construction) structure needing an SUP and building permit, Mr. Peoples gave indication that he still planned to continue working on the structure. Staff explained to Mr. Peoples that if he continued working on the structure before it (potentially) received Council's approval, he would be doing so at his own risk. Mr. Peoples subsequently submitted a letter to staff, generally expressing that he understood that. General discussion took place pertaining to the existing structure (that Mr. Peoples has continued to work on) and how stopping its construction and having it torn down will be an enforcement-related issue, should it come to that in the future. Indication was given that, related to 'enforcement,' any daily or other fines would be up to the judge.

Following extensive discussion and clarifications, Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to call for all of the improper structures to be removed before this particular SUP may be granted and that Mr. Peoples must do so within six (6) months. The motion was clarified – that Mr. Peoples should not perform further work on this current structure and that the other, existing (improper) structures must be removed within six (6) months. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion.

Pruitt reopened the public hearing (that was continued from the last council meeting) and asked if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he then called for the vote.

The above noted motion then passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays. The ordinance (caption) was read into the record as follows:

Harrison Survey, Abstract No. 97, Rockwall County, Texas, and take any action necessary (1st reading).

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided brief background information pertaining to this agenda item. The applicant, Mr. Atkins, came forth and explained that this annexation will bring additional land into the city that will be utilized for an extension of the Saddlestar subdivision (it will be "Saddlestar South"). He indicated that some builders have already been retained for the future building of homes in this neighborhood.

Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to approve A2018-004. Councilmember Macalik seconded the motion.

5. Discuss and consider approval of a concept plan for Harbor Urban Beach Park, and take any action necessary.

Director of Parks & Recreation, Andy Hesser, came forth and addressed the Council concerning this agenda item. He shared a visual concept plan that showed renderings of the proposed lakeside (Urban Beach) park area. Extensive discussion ensued regarding a proposed Phase I and Phase II of this park project, including whether or not a restroom facility should be included in Phase I and the options for where that facility might possibly Discussion also took place pertaining to what funds have already been budgeted versus what funds would possibly need to be taken out of the General Fund to ensure adequate funding for a restroom facility. Mayor Pruitt indicated that he prefers to include a restroom facility as part of this plan because he anticipates that the city will receive complaints if it is not included. Regarding the topic of parking, Mr. Hesser explained that a the public parking garage on the nearest side of the Cinemark movie theater is slated to be constructed by Pegasus-Abalon prior to this park area being developed. So, that would be the nearest available parking area for those visiting this park. Mr. Hesser shared brief comments about some of the proposed amenities, including a sand beach area, volleyball amenities, vegetation separation between the park and the facilities up the hill from it, walking trail areas, etc.

Following extensive discussion, Mr. Crowley, City Manager, suggested that staff bring back a financing plan for Phase I (with a restroom facility included in the numbers). Further discussion then ensued pertaining to where the restroom facility might ultimately be located. Mr. Hesser showed the Council the two different options that have been identified for possible placement of the restroom facility. One option will include obtaining an easement from the City of Dallas, and it may not be ideally located for whatever ultimately gets constructed up the hill from the restroom facility. The other possible placement for the restroom facility may ultimately have fewer complications as far as easements are concerned, but it would be located on the far end, just around the corner. Concern was expressed by some Council members regarding possibly placing the restroom on the far end, around the corner, as it may be too far for visitors to walk. However, concern was also expressed by some members of Council who wonder if those who occupy the buildings up the hill from the park may not appreciate looking at the back of a restroom facility if one were placed at the other potential location that's been identified.

 Following extensive discussion regarding the placement of the restroom facility, Council generally indicated agreement with it being placed over near IH-30 (around the corner on the far end of the park); however, staff will need to return to the Council with more specific details related to how much Phase I will cost if the restroom facility is added and if the trail that leads to the restrooms is constructed. No formal action was taken as a result of this discussion item at this time.

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6. Discuss and consider a recommendation of the City Council Naming Subcommittee regarding approval of a resolution naming a parks and recreation venue in the City, and take any action necessary.

On behalf of the subcommittee, Councilmember Daniels shared that a recommendation is being put forth to name the amphitheater at The Harbor the "Brad Griggs Amphitheater Stage at The Harbor." He then moved to approve the resolution to do so. Mayor Pruitt seconded the motion, which passed unanimously (7 ayes to 0 nays).

7. Discuss and consider legislative topics for the 86th Session of the Texas Legislature, and take any action necessary.

Assistant City Manager Joey Boyd provided background information pertaining to this agenda item, generally indicating that staff has compiled and made available to Council in tonight's informational meeting packet a bullet pointed list of topics that may be of interest to the City during the upcoming state legislative session. Mayor Pruitt commented that the list looks like a pretty good list. Council took no formal action concerning this agenda item.

8. Discuss and consider (re)appointments to the city's Main Street Advisory Board, and take any action necessary.

Councilmember Trowbridge moved to reappoint Pricylla Bento and Jeremy Standifer to continue serving on the Main Street Advisory Board for an additional two-year term. Councilmember Macalik seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

Councilman Trowbridge moved to appoint Eva Cannon to replace Sarah Freed on the Main Street Advisory Board (for a two-year term). Councilmember Macalik seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

Councilmember Macalik arrived and joined 18 the meeting at 4:04 p.m. Estimated costs and funding sources were also presented to Council as part 19 20 of Mr. Hesser's presentation. 21 22 Councilmember Fowler expressed that he likes "Option 2," which includes a restroom facility and is estimated at \$484,010. He asked if this option could have amenities added to it in the future. Mr. 23 Hesser indicated that, yes, some things could be added. Mr. Fowler shared that the only thing he 24 25 might immediately add to Option 2 would be an additional seating node. 26 Councilmember Trowbridge asked for clarification regarding funding. Extensive, general discussion ensued pertaining to costs, other 35 36 neighborhood parks within the city, amenities, and the like. 37 38 Council took no formal action as a result of this work session discussion.

Mayor Pruitt called forth Mary Smith, Assistant City Manager, Debbie Waters, (Municipal) Court Administrator and Tia Hambrick, Court Clerk as well as a representative from an organization called the ESGR (Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve), which is a Department of Defense program. Indication was given that this organization was established in 1972 to promote cooperation and understanding between Reserve Component Service members and their civilian employers. Ms. Hambrick then read two statements, one addressed to Mrs. Smith and one addressed to Mrs. Waters. Each of them was then presented with an award to recognize and thank them for their support of Ms. Hambrick over the years as she has participated in various military related endeavors while employed by the City of Rockwall for the last fourteen years. APPOINTMENT ITEMS

1. Appointment with the Planning and Zoning Chairman to discuss and answer any questions regarding cases on the agenda and related issues and take any action necessary.

Chairman of the city's Planning & Zoning Commission, Johnny Lyons, came forth and addressed the Council, providing brief comments regarding recommendations of the Commission relative to planning-related items on tonight's meeting agenda. No discussion ensued and no action was taken by Council as a result of Mr. Lyons' briefing.

2. Appointment with the city's ART Commission Chairman to hear a presentation regarding a public art fiberglass guitar project and to consider authorizing associated funding in the amount of \$5,500 from the city's "Art in Public Places" funds, and take any action necessary.

David Sweet of the city's ART Commission came forth and gave a brief presentation regarding this proposed project. Following his presentation, Mayor Pruitt moved to authorize the expenditure of \$5,500 as requested. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed unanimously of those present (7 ayes to 0 nays).

3. Appointment with resident Jillian Gaines to hear concerns related to water around her home and neighborhood (address: 1305 Clear Meadow Court), and take any action necessary.

Ms. Gaines came forth and addressed the Council during this appointment item. She generally expressed concern related to water in and around the streets and properties within the subdivision in which she lives and on the street on which she resides. She also has concerns about water on her own, personal residential property.

Mayor Pruitt indicated that several council members have traveled to the locations in and around Ms. Gaines home in The Shores since the last time Ms. Gaines came before the Council to express water-related concerns. He shared that he personally knows of three other locations (not in The Shores) where groundwater settles on the pavement following rain events within the city. He expressed that there hasn't been any significant rain events lately, so the underground springs and ground water

have not had the opportunity to seep up and stand on the concrete pavement recently. Mayor Pruitt shared that the city cannot make the HOA in which Ms. Gaines lives do anything about concerns related to french drain installation or retaining wall repairs. He understands that there are areas within the city where ground water seeps up and causes standing water to pool; however, he does not believe there is anything that the city or the city council can do regarding ground water. Council took no action as a result of this Appointment Item.

XII. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. Z2018-058 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Tim McCallum of He Wines She Dines, LLC on behalf of Buffalo Creek Business Park, LTD for the approval of an ordinance for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for a Craft Winery and Commercial Amusement/Recreation (Outdoor) on a 7.2-acre tract of land identified as Tracts 20-01 & 20-7 of the W. W. Ford Survey, Abstract No. 80, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Commercial (C) District, addressed as 203 County Line Road, and take any action necessary [1st Reading].

City Planning Director Ryan Miller provided brief background information pertaining to this agenda item. The applicant is currently running a subscription-based wine business. The venue has been holding special events at this location through the city's "special events" ordinance; however, doing so limits the business to only four events per year, and the applicant would like to hold more than four events annually. Mr. Miller shared that Council may wish to consider the following conditions related to this SUP request:

1) The operation of the *Craft Winery* and *Commercial Amusement/Recreation (Outdoor)* on the subject property shall be subject to the following operational conditions, which are contained in the SUP ordinance:

A. Craft Winery:

- 1) The maximum square footage of the building used for a winery shall not exceed 12,000 SF in total building area, and is depicted in *Exhibit 'C'* of the draft ordinance.
- 2) The areas dedicated to the direct sale of the on-site manufactured product shall not exceed 40% of the total floor area of the building, and is depicted in *Exhibit 'D'* of the draft ordinance.
- 3) The hours open to the public for this facility shall be limited to Sunday through Saturday, 11:00 AM to 12:00 AM.

B. Commercial Amusement/Recreation (Outdoor)

- 1) The operation of a Commercial Amusement/Recreation (Outdoor) use shall generally conform to the Concept Plan depicted in Exhibit 'B' of this ordinance.
- 2) The Subject Property may be used for all permitted accessory uses as well as the use of an outdoor venue that may include live music and food truck vendors as depicted in Exhibit 'B' of this ordinance. The use of temporary tents or similar uses must be made of fire retardant materials and meet the City's fire codes.
- 3) The hours of operation associated with the Outdoor Venue for this facility shall be limited to Thursday through Monday, 11:00 AM to 12:00 AM.
- 4) There shall be no outside storage of equipment, furniture, or other materials associated with the operation of this business or from any outdoor gatherings on the Subject Property.

- 5) No parking associated with the uses permitted on the *Subject Property* shall be permitted along County Line Road or Horizon Road [FM-3097].
- 2) Any construction or building necessary to complete this request must conform to the requirements set forth by the *UDC*, the *International Building Code*, the *Rockwall Municipal Code of Ordinances*, city adopted engineering and fire codes and with all other regulatory requirements administered and/or enforced by the state and federal government.

On January 2, 2019, staff mailed 63 notices to property owners and residents within 500-feet of the subject property. Staff did not send a neighborhood HOA notification, as there were no Home Owners Associations (HOA's) participating in the Neighborhood Notification Program within 1500-feet of the subject property. At the time staff's report was drafted, one e-mail opposed to the applicant's request had been received. In addition, the city's Planning & Zoning Commission recommended approval of this item by a vote of 5-2.

Mr. McCallum came forth to address the Council concerning this public hearing item. He briefed the Council on his and his wife's existing business, including the business model, which focuses on online direct sales, wine festivals and events.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing.

Brief clarifying questions and answered took place among Council members, staff and the applicant. Councilmember Daniels asked for clarification about "used on a limited and infrequent basis." Mr. Miller clarified that if this SUP is granted, the applicant could (potentially) hold an event there every night of the week from Thursday thru Monday. Mr. Daniels expressed concern about this, especially related to residential homes located nearby. He has a problem with the 'unlimited frequency' timeframe related to how the SUP ordinance drafted (which would allow it to be open five nights out of the week).

Councilman Trowbridge asked for clarification regarding where PD-75 is located. Mr. Miller indicated that this is located in the Lake Rockwall Estates Subdivision area.

Mayor Pruitt expressed concern that the hours would allow wine tastings, for example, until midnight. He would prefer that the time be cut off at about 10:00 p.m. at night.

Councilmember Macalik moved to approve Z2018-058. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion.

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. The applicant is requesting a change in zoning from an Agricultural (AG) District to a Light Industrial (LI) District for the purpose of constructing a house of worship on the subject property. The subject property is situated on a 6.03-acre tract of land, zoned Agricultural (AG) District, situated within the SH-205 By-Pass Overlay (SH-205 BY OV) District, and located east of the intersection of Justin Road and John King Boulevard. The subject property was annexed in 1985 [Ordinance No. 85-69] and is zoned Agricultural (AG) District. The Agricultural (AG) District is a holding district with the intent that a property will be rezoned in conformance with the Future Land Use Plan contained in the Comprehensive Plan. According to Section 1.0, Use of Land and Buildings, of Article IV, Permissible Uses, of the Unified Development Code (UDC), a house of worship is permitted in an Agricultural (AG) District by Specific Use Permit (SUP) or permitted by-right in a Light Industrial (LI) District. The proposed request to rezone the property to Light Industrial (LI) District is in conformance with the City's Future Land Use Plan.

On January 14, 2019, staff mailed 10 notices to property owners and residents within 500-feet of the subject property. There are no HOA's/Neighborhood Associations within 1,500-feet of the subject property participating in the Neighborhood Notification Program. At the time the case memo was drafted, staff had not received any notices concerning this case. On January 29, 2019, the Planning and Zoning Commission's motion to recommend approval of the change in zoning from an Agricultural (AG) District to a Light Industrial (LI) District passed by a vote of 7-0.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing and asked if the applicant has received approval from the FAA, as it is located within a flight path. Mr. Miller shared that the applicant will obtain any necessary 'letter of approval' from the FAA. There being no one wishing to come forth and speak, he then closed the public hearing and called the applicant forth.

Mayor Pro Tem Fowler called the public meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Pro Tem Kevin Fowler and Council Members Patrick Trowbridge, John Hohenshelt, and Bennie Daniels. Also present were City Manager Rick Crowley, Assistant City Managers Mary Smith and Joey Boyd and the city's legal counsel, Patrick Lindner. Council Members Dana Macalik and Trace Johannesen were absent from the meeting. Mayor Pruitt arrived to the meeting at 6:16 p.m. as noted below.

II. WORK SESSION

1. Hold a work session to discuss and consider implementing the use of a tool created by the Planning and Zoning Department in conjunction with zoning cases, and take any action necessary.

Planning Director Ryan Miller addressed the Council concerning this work session item. He shared general details pertaining to a tool that has been created that will help with conducting cost/benefit analyses for zoning cases. Overall, Council seemed to be in favor of the tool and provided positive feedback overall. Council took no action as a result of this work session discussion.

2. Hold a work session to discuss and consider strategies for the IH-30 Corridor as stated in the IH-30 Corridor Planning Study, and take any action necessary.

Mr. Miller also spoke to the Council concerning this work session agenda item. He shared both "defensive" and "offensive" strategies concerning future development (and redevelopment) of the portion of IH-30 that runs through the City of Rockwall. Trends related to "big box stores" and retailers, in general, were discussed. Council did not express any specific concerns about the information Mr. Miller presented. No formal action was taken as a result of these discussions.

3. Hold work session to discuss the "Staffing and Adequate Fire and Emergency Response" (S.A.F.E.R.) Grant Program through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (F.E.M.A.)

Fire Chief Kenneth Cullins came forth and addressed Council concerning this work session item. He explained that this grant program helps communities meet industry minimum standards and attain 24-hour staffing to provide adequate protection from fire and fire-related hazards, and to fulfill traditional missions of fire departments. He generally indicated that staff would like to evaluate Council's interest in city staff potentially submitting a grant application on behalf of the Rockwall Fire Department, specifically for staffing. He explained that it is a 3-year grant program, and the grant would pay:

- Year 1 75% of the annual cost of a first-year firefighter
 - Year 2 75% of the annual cost of a first-year firefighter
 - Year 3 35% of the annual cost of a first-year firefighter
 - Year 4 and beyond City picks up 100% of the cost

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Staff shared information on projected base salary and benefits package costs to fund 12 personnel (through taking advantage of grant funding). Chief Cullins explained that this proposal, if the grant funds were awarded, would bring minimum staffing to 12 (3 per each of the city's four fire stations). Following the discussion, Mayor Pro Tem Fowler pointed out that this topic appears later on this evening under "Action Items." No action was taken at this time.

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At 5:11 p.m., Mayor Pro Tem Fowler read the below discussion items into the public record before recessing the meeting to go into Executive Session.

Suresh Shridharani on behalf of Harlan Properties, Inc. is requesting the annexation for the purpose of incorporating the property into the City of Rockwall to develop a residential subdivision. Staff should note, that since the property is not contiguous to the City's corporate limits, an additional 9.885-acres of SH-276 right-of-way will also need to be annexed along with the subject property. The City Council conducted the required hearings (first and second) on January 22 2019, and staff has followed the procedures for annexations as set forth in Chapter 43, Municipal Annexations, of the Texas Local Government Code (TLGC) with regard to notifying affected property owners and publishing notices in the newspaper and on the City's website.

The motion passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Pruitt).

X. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. Z2019-003 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Jeff Bresee of SET Engineers on behalf of James Watson of the Rockwall Independent School District (RISD) for the approval of an **ordinance** for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for a Private Sports Arena, Stadium or Track on a 35.295-acre parcel of land identified as Lot 1, Block A, Rockwall High School Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Commercial (C) District, situated within the IH-30 Overlay (IH-30 OV) District, addressed as 901 W. Yellow Jacket Lane, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. The applicant is requesting the approval of a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for a Private Sports Arena, Stadium, or Track on the subject property. Currently, the Rockwall Independent School District (RISD) utilizes this area as an existing multi-purpose field that serves as a practice facility for various sports (e.g. softball, baseball, football, soccer, discus, etc.). According to the applicant, in order to protect vehicles and/or patrons of the nearby commercial businesses (e.g. Rooms-To-Go, Heritage Buick-GMC, the future Texas Roadhouse Restaurant and Marriott Towneplace Suites hotel) adjacent to the field, the school is requesting to construct a 40-foot fence/netting combination around the perimeter of the field. Notices were sent out to adjacent property / land owners; however, no responses were received back by staff. The Planning & Zoning Commission has recommended approval of this item by a vote of 4 in favor with 3 absences. If the City Council chooses to approve the applicant's request, staff proposed that the Council consider the following conditions of approval:

The applicant shall be responsible for maintaining compliance with the following conditions:

- The private arena, stadium, or track shall generally conform to concept and photometric plans and elevations depicted in Exhibits 'B', 'C', and 'D' of the attached ordinance;
- The light fixtures shall not be mounted above 40-feet in height.

Any construction resulting from the approval of this zoning change shall conform to the requirements set forth by the Unified Development Code (UDC), the International Building Code (IBC), the Rockwall Municipal Code of Ordinances, city adopted engineering and fire codes and with all other applicable regulatory requirements administered and/or enforced by the state and federal government.

Tim Listing, Construction Project Manager for RISD, came forth and addressed the Council concerning this agenda item, indicating that he is happy to answer any questions the Council may have.

Mayor Pro Tem Fowler opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time.

Bob Wacker 309 Featherstone Rockwall, TX

Mr. Wacker came forth and expressed that as long as there are not loud speakers or offensive lighting, he thinks this will be okay. As a side note, he expressed that he has some input related to changing of speed limits that he would like to share with staff/council.

There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak, Mayor Pro Tem Fowler closed the public hearing.

Councilman Trowbridge moved to approve Z2019-003. Councilmember Macalik seconded the motion. Mayor Pro Tem Fowler shared that he is not crazy about a large, black chain link fence, especially considering that it is visible from IH-30. The applicant briefly came forth and provided comments regarding Fowler's concerns. He also pointed out that the location abuts the rear of "Rooms-to-Go," so putting any sort of landscaping does not seem logical. He clarified that the chain link fence will be about 10' tall, and the netting will begin above that. He went on to briefly describe the netting that will be utilized. Various sport practices only will take place at the location (no games), so the netting will be utilized to essentially help ensure random sports balls do not escape the practice fields. Councilman Daniels expressed concern about the netting. He does not wish for netting like that which is used at a "Top Golf," for example, be visible from IH-30, especially in an "Overlay District." Councilman Johannesen questions why the City might grant all of these exceptions, other than the fact that the applicant is a school district. He is not sure that so many exceptions would be made if the applicant were not a school district. Brief discussion took place related to a grading study / plan. Following extensive discussion, the ordinance was read as follows:

The motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor with 0 absences.

2. P2019-008 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Kevin Osornio on behalf of Jeaniffer Osornio for the approval of a replat for Lots 1 & 2, Block A, N. E. & J.O. Addition being a 0.46-acre parcel of land identified as Lot 2, Block A, Sanger Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Single Family 7 (SF-7) District, situated within the Southside Residential Overlay (SOV) District, addressed as 705 Peters Colony, and take any action necessary.

Planning Director, Ryan Miller, provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. The applicant is requesting to replat a 0.46-acre parcel of land for the purpose of subdividing one lot (i.e. Lot 2, Block A, Sanger Addition) into two (2) lots (i.e. Lots 1 & 2, Block A, N. E. & J. O. Addition) in order to construct single-family homes on Lots 1 & 2. The subject property was annexed prior to 1959, is situated within the Southside Residential Neighborhood Overlay (SOV) District, and is zoned Single-Family 7 (SF-7) District. Thirty-nine public notices were sent out to adjacent land and property owners; however, no notices were received back by staff. The Planning & Zoning Commission has recommended approval of this item by a vote of 4 to 0.

On March 5, 2019, the Parks and Recreation Board reviewed the proposed *replat* and made the following recommendations:

- 1) The developer shall pay pro-rata equipment fees for Park District No. 21 in the amount of \$516.00 for Lot 2. This will need to be paid at time of final plat and is subject to change pending the City Council's adoption of the 2019 fees; and
- 2) The developer shall pay cash-in-lieu of land fees for Park District No. 21 in the amount of \$416.00 for Lot 2. This will need to be paid at time of final plat and is subject to change pending the City Council's adoption of the 2019 fees.

The surveyor has completed the majority of the technical revisions requested by staff, and this plat - conforming to the requirements for final plats as stated in the Subdivision Ordinance in the Municipal Code of Ordinances -- is recommended for conditional approval pending the completion of final technical modifications and submittal requirements.

Conditional approval of this plat by the City Council shall constitute approval subject to the conditions stipulated in the *Conditions of Approval* section below.

With the exception of the items listed in the *Conditions of Approval* section of staff's case memo, the plat is in substantial compliance with the requirements of the *Subdivision Ordinance* in the *Municipal Code of Ordinances*.

Following Mr. Miller's comments, Councilman Trowbridge moved to approve this item, including staff recommendations. Councilman Hohenshelt seconded the motion. The motion passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Pruitt).

XI. ACTION ITEMS

 Discuss and consider authorizing the City Manager to execute an agreement with Doliver Enterprises LLC dba HHW Solutions for the collection and disposal of household hazardous waste and take any action necessary.

Assistant City Manager Mary Smith provided brief, introductory comments pertaining to this agenda item. She generally indicated that the company that had been providing "Household Hazardous Waste Day" services significantly increased its pricing, which caused the city to have to look for a potential alternative. Mr. Dick Demien came forth and briefly introduced himself. He shared that he is a long time Rockwall resident. He went on to share that this service is a "porch pickup" service (not a

curbside pickup). It is currently provided in various other cities within Texas. The company is a viable one with no known complaints against it. Indication was given that this will be a .99 cents per household, per month cost to citizens. His company is heavily regulated by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). He shared that their main goal is to allow citizens to come and pick up items and reuse them. They also encourage repurposing of items. Their last resort is taking items to an industrial-type landfill; however, it is not their preference. Councilman Hohenshelt expressed a little concern about extending a five-year contract. He prefers a one or two-year contract to start. Mr. Demien shared that there are provisions in the contract that will allow cancellation of the contract if his company is not 'doing its job.' City Attorney Frank Garza shared that he is still working with the company to clean up some of the language. Councilman Hohenshelt shared that he would like to have a final version of the contract brought back to Council for review and consideration, and he would like the 'cancel the contract' language to be very, very clear. Following the discussion, Councilman Hohenshelt moved to direct the city manager to negotiate the contract and bring it back to Council for approval at a future date. Councilman Daniels seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Pruitt).

2. Discuss and consider strategies for the IH-30 Corridor as stated in the IH-30 Corridor Planning Study, and take any action necessary.

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided background information pertaining to this agenda item, reminding Council that this topic was discussed at a work session with Council back on February 19. At that time, the City Council directed staff to prioritize the strategies listed in the IH-30 Commercial Corridor Planning Study based on the corridor zone that the strategy was intended to support. In response to this direction, staff has prepared several maps that summarize and prioritize the strategies for each of the targeted corridor zones. In prioritizing each strategy, staff took into account [1] the estimated costs of the strategy, [2] the time needed to implement the strategy, and [3] the perceived impact of the strategy. It was pointed out that staff's memo shows the strategies that staff believes may be more viably doable / workable versus those that may not be as viable. Mr. Miller pointed out that all of the approved strategies would be incorporated into the OURHometown Vision 2040 Comprehensive Plan and would form the framework for how the zone is developed in the future. Following brief discussion, Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to approve the removal of all the items (potential strategies) shown in red font on staff's memo. Councilman Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Pruitt).

- 53 Mayor Pruitt delivered the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

- 55 VIII. PROCLAMATIONS
 - 1. Child Abuse Awareness & Prevention Month
 - Mayor Pruitt called forth representatives from Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), Rainbow Room, and the Child Advocacy Center. He then read and presented the proclamation for "Child Abuse Awareness and Prevention Month." Representatives from each of these three organizations introduced themselves and briefly spoke about the services they provide. Mayor Pruitt then called for a short break, recessing the meeting at 6:15 p.m.

2. Public Water System Celebration Day

Mayor Pruitt reconvened the meeting at 6:21 p.m. He then called forth City Engineer/Public Works Director, Amy Williams, Water & Wastewater Manager, Rick Sherer, Water Superintendent, Curtis McAdden, and Aaron McNeill, Water/Wastewater employee. He read and presented them with this proclamation in recognition of a recent TX Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) waster system inspection in which no violations were found. Ms. Williams complimented city staff on their hard, meticulous work and dedication to providing Rockwall citizens with superior water.

- IX. OPEN FORUM
- Mayor Pruitt explained how Open Forum is conducted, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time.

Amanda Romero (110 E. Rusk St.), Director of Operations for "Groovy's," came forth and addressed the Council concerning street closures in/around the downtown historic square. She explained she is speaking on behalf of Christie Foster, Owner of Groovy's, who could not be present this evening. She generally expressed concern about downtown special events that involve street closures and/or closing off of parking spaces that might otherwise be used by business patrons wanting to visit shops, business and restaurants downtown. Her company is generally not in favor of additional events with road / parking space closures because there is no evidence that such events help boost business' sales.

 Tammy Sharp of T&T Color Supply (202 N. Fannin) came forth and indicated that she has provided Council with correspondence she has collected from 20 downtown merchants. Each business owner 100% supports Farmers Market, and they are 100% against any additional street closures. She went on

to share data related to businesses that have "come and gone" (business turnover) on the downtown square. The occupancy rate is about 95-97%, and properties only stay on the market for an average of 4-6 weeks. She pointed out that some closures cannot be attributed to 'location' alone. There are sometimes several other factors that may be attributed to a business closing. She went on to point out several of the downtown businesses that have survived and done well for several years. She spoke about how some other cities handle car shows, pointing out that they are sometime held 'after hours' when businesses are closed, thereby not adversely impacting businesses. She generally spoke highly of "Farmers Market" and thanked council members for their time.

Claudette Hatfield (1 Shadydale Lane Rockwall, TX) came forth and shared that she and Barb Coleson started Farmer's Market in 2008 because they saw that the downtown area and businesses were struggling. They also started the "Friends of Downtown" organization. She believes that closing additional streets in and around downtown will not be beneficial to businesses and restaurants. She suggested that the driveway beside the city's Parks & Recreation offices and the adjacent public parking lot be considered for a 'car show' if it comes to pass that a car show is an event that is approved to be held in the future.

David Sweet (510 Carriage Trail Rockwall, TX) came forth and provided Council with a historical recap of "Main Street" related programs and activities that have unfolded over the years, beginning in about 2008. He believes that downtown Rockwall is the city's "crown jewel." He thanked the Council for all of its support of the downtown. He believes that Farmers Market is a large success, and he thanked Barb Coleson, Claudette Hatfield, and others for their hard work on events that have helped support downtown. He encouraged Council to consider its support of the downtown area.

Mrs. Hatfield came forth again and commented that Rockwall's Farmers Market is different than any other of its kind because it benefits local charities (she indicated \$20,000 in the last two years).

There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak, Mayor Pruitt then closed Open Forum.

The motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor with 1 absence (Hohenshelt).

Councilmember Trowbridge asked if this particular street is located within the Rockwall Historic District. He expressed that he would love for the city to consider a street name that might be more historical (in lieu of the one being proposed this evening). Mr. Boyd, Assistant City Manager, shared that staff can work with the subcommittee to explore other, possible (more historic) names. So, Council took no formal action pertaining to Consent Agenda item #7 at this time.

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Mayor Pruitt addressed Action Item #3 next (Shores Park crosswalk item).

XI. APPOINTMENT ITEMS

1. Appointment with the Planning and Zoning Chairman to discuss and answer any questions regarding cases on the agenda and related issues and take any action necessary.

Mayor Pruitt called the public meeting back to order at 7:53 p.m. Indication was given that this item was not needed, so it was not addressed by Council.

2. Appointment with representatives of the Downtown Rockwall Association to discuss proposed event schedule and potential street closures in downtown, and take any action necessary.

Tamara Desierto Kolleck
20 Intrepid Circle

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Ms. Kolleck came forth and shared that she is currently the (new) President of the Downtown Rockwall Association (DRA). She loves downtown, and she recognizes and acknowledges that Rockwall's Farmer's Market has done a lot to lay a good foundation for downtown. She does not wish to see Farmers Market end. However, she would like to propose some new ideas that might help improve the downtown area and its businesses. She indicated that she is a fairly new business owner in the downtown area. She

went on to share a presentation with Council concerning the downtown area, including topics such as business turnover, months in which sales slow down, Recurring DRA events such as Cinco de Mayo, Scare on the Square, Rib Rub Run & Roll, and Hometown Christmas. She went on to explain that the DRA is asking for permission for four additional events that would have street closures. She went on to share details of these event ideas with Council.

Councilmember Trowbridge clarified his understanding that Ms. Kolleck is asking to utilize city owned parking spaces to charge a fee to those who visit. Ms. Kolleck affirmed that she is in fact asking to utilize public parking spaces to charge a fee, the monies of which would be considered a fundraiser that would be reinvested into the downtown area by the "DRA." Clarification also took place related to current members of the DRA and which of those businesses may or may not be in favor of the additional, proposed events that Mrs. Kolleck has explained this evening. Mayor Pruitt shared that he does not believe the city should be supporting events that close streets for things like car shows, food trucks or beer strolls. He explained that the public has the perception that, even if it is not a 'city sponsored' or 'city run' event, the city still assumes responsibility for it. Pruitt, Fowler and Johannesen all expressed concern about there being an apparent 'fracture' or disagreement among and between downtown business owners. Council members generally encouraged Ms. Kolleck to work together with all of the downtown businesses to become unified regarding existing and future proposed events.

Following his lengthy comments and expressions of concern, Mayor Pruitt made a motion to approve closure of the streets for the four key events that have historically been held downtown. Councilmember Daniels seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 in favor with 1 absent (Hohenshelt).

Mayor Pruitt then addressed Appointment Item #3 next.

3. Appointment with the city's ART Commission Chairman to review artist's design for the public art fiberglass guitar project, and take any action necessary.

Judge Sweet, current Chairman of the city's ART Commission, came forth and introduced two of his fellow commission members, Kathleen Morrow and Doug Agee. He then briefed the Council on details related to this agenda item. Estimated ship date for the fiberglass guitars is currently mid-April. There will be a total of five (initial) guitars and five artists who will be working to make each of these five guitars unique. They will tie into the city's designation as the "Free Live Music Capital of North Texas." Artist renderings for each of the five guitars have been provided to the Council in their meeting packet. The five artists are local and will be volunteering their time and talents affix their individual, unique artwork on these guitars.

Following additional comments, council generally expressed support for moving forward. However, no formal action was taken by Council concerning this agenda item.

Mayor Pruitt addressed the Consent Agenda next.

XII. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider an **ordinance** amending the Code or Ordinances in Ch. 44. Utilities; Article V. Water; Division 6. "Water Conservation" for the purpose of adopting a new Water Conservation Plan for the City, and take any action necessary. (1st reading)

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City Engineer Amy Williams provided brief comments related to this public hearing item. Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing. (See next agenda item)

2. Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider an **ordinance** amending the Code or Ordinances in Ch. 44. Utilities; Article V. Water; Division 7. "Drought Contingency & Water Emergency Response Plan" for the purpose of repealing it and adopting the "Water Resource and Emergency Management Plan" for the city, and take any action necessary. (1st reading)

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing.

He went on to share that he has looked into the legal requirements associated with this plan, and he has observed that the law is not very specific about what has to be included in the plan - it only requires that the city have one. He generally has concerns about limiting what residents can and cannot do with water (especially when they are paying for it) when the city is not in a drought. For example, he is not in favor of making citizens criminally responsible for washing their driveway when the city is not in a drought.

Councilmember Johannesen moved to approve the ordinances for Public Hearing Item #1 and #2. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion. The two ordinances were read as follows:

DROUGHT CONTINGENCY AND WATER EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN TO REPEAL DIVISION 7. IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REPLACE IT WITH A NEW DIVISION 7. ADOPTING A WATER RESOURCE AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PLAN; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY OF A FINE NOT TO EXCEED THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000.00) FOR EACH OFFENSE; AND A SEPARATE OFFENSE SHALL BE DEEMED COMMITTED ON EACH DAY DURING OR ON WHICH A VIOLATION OCCURS; PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A REPEALER CLAUSE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTVE DATE.

The motion passed by a vote of 4 ayes, 2 nays (Daniels and Pruitt), and 1 absence (Hohenshelt). Councilmember Fowler shared that he would like for the Council to revisit these ordinances at some point in the near future, as he believes that Mayor Pruitt expressed some valid concerns and posed some relevant questions. City Attorney Frank Garza shared that the Council may reconsider the ordinances between first and second reading, or it may do so at any time at a later date.

324 XIII. ACTION ITEMS

1. Discuss and consider the overall concept plan and proposed Phase I of the Harbor Urban Beach Park, and take any action necessary.

Park Director Andy Hesser came forth and addressed Council concerning this agenda item. He provided visual examples for the Council related to the outdoor stone game tables, the fitness obstacle course, the shade umbrellas for the beach area, play structures, Boccee Ball Court, volleyball courts, and seating nodes. He went on to share the various options and associated costs for items and amenities the Council may wish to include in "Phase I." General discussion took place among council members and staff related to the park's development, including possible submission of a grant application in December. Mr. Hesser explained that if the grant were to be awarded to the City, it is possible that up to \$500k could be received (local match is required), but the city would not find out about its application status (if it gets awarded or not) until the following June. Mayor Pruitt asked for a visual and for the cost estimate related to building and funding the entire 'wish list' for this park. Mr. Hesser showed the Council the concept plan for the 'full wish list,' indicating that it would cost an estimated \$850,000. Council members generally indicated support for staff working with the consultant to submit a \$500,000 grant application in December to do the entire project.

Mayor Pruitt then made a motion to approve the concept plan that depicted the full project (including the restroom facility). Councilmember Daniels seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Hohenshelt).

2. Discuss and consider authorizing the City Manager to execute an agreement with Doliver Enterprises LLC dba HHW Solutions for the collection and disposal of household hazardous waste, and take any action necessary.

Mr. Doliver came forth and briefed the Council on this agenda item. Councilmember Fowler moved to approve Action Item #2. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Hohenshelt).

3. Discuss and consider Shores Park crosswalk assessment study, and take any action necessary.

Mayor Pruitt addressed this item following the Consent Agenda items. City Manager Rick Crowley provided brief, introductory comments related to this agenda item, thanking Rockwall Police Department Captain Ed Fowler for the work he put in on this study. Mr. Crowley went on to indicate that staff is recommending the Council consider authorizing the funding and installation of two crosswalks. Councilmember Trowbridge moved to approve the two crosswalks, as presented. Mayor Pruitt seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 in favor with 1 absence (Hohenshelt). Mr. Crowley indicated that staff will order the equipment for the crosswalks and provide Council with an update on their future installation and associated timeline once that information is known.

Mayor Pruitt recessed the meeting for a break between 7:36 and 7:53 p.m.

4. Discuss and consider recommendations from the Council's Hotel Occupancy Tax Funding (HOT) Subcommittee, and take any action necessary.

City Manager Rick Crowley addressed the Council concerning this agenda item. Mayor Pruitt indicated that he would like to hold a fairly lengthy work session with staff and Council to discuss this topic in greater, more focused detail at a future council meeting. Following additional comments, Council took no action concerning this agenda item at this time.

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5. Discuss and consider adoption of resolutions related to HB3535 / SB1152 and related to HB2439 / SB1266 and other legislative matters, and take any action necessary.

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City Manager Rick Crowley provided brief, introductory comments to Council concerning this agenda item. Mayor Pruitt indicated that one of these bills - HB2439 - will essentially do away with a city's ability to have zoning regulations. After lengthy discussion, Mayor Pruitt moved to adopt the resolutions and work with staff on the final language for each of them. Councilman Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 in favor with 1 absent (Hohenshelt).

I. CALL PUBLIC MEETING TO ORDER

Mayor Pruitt called the public meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Jim Pruitt, Mayor Pro Tem Kevin Fowler, and City Council Members Patrick Trowbridge, Dana Macalik, John Hohenshelt, Kevin Fowler, Bennie Daniels and Trace Johannesen. Also present were City Manager Rick Crowley, Assistant City Managers Mary Smith and Joey Boyd, and City Attorney Frank Garza.

Mayor Pruitt read the below listed discussion items into the record before recessing the public meeting to go into Executive Session.

II. EXECUTIVE SESSION.

THE CITY OF ROCKWALL CITY COUNCIL WILL RECESS INTO EXECUTIVE SESSION TO DISCUSS THE FOLLOWING MATTERS AS AUTHORIZED BY CHAPTER 551 OF THE TEXAS GOVERNMENT CODE:

- Discussion regarding (re)appointments to city regulatory boards, commissions, and committees - specifically the N. TX Municipal Water District (NTMWD) Board (interviews) pursuant to Section 551.074 (Personnel Matters)
- 2. Discussion regarding legal issues pertaining to potential annexation pursuant to Section §551.071 (Attorney/Client Consultation).
- 3. Discussion regarding the appeal to the Public Utility Commission filed by the cities of Garland, Mesquite, Plano and Richardson against the North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) regarding water rates pursuant to Section §551.071 (Consultation with Attorney)

VI. INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE - MAYOR PRO TEM FOWLER

Mayor Pro Tem Fowler delivered the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

VII. PROCLAMATIONS

1. Public Safety Telecommunications Week

Mayor Pruitt called forth Assistant Police Chief Kirk Aldridge and several Dispatch staff members. He then read and presented them with this proclamation, thanking them for all they do for the safety of our police and fire staff and the public.

2. National Day of Prayer

Mayor Pruitt indicated that he will give this proclamation at the Mayor's Prayer Breakfast on Thurs., May 2 at The Center.

3. Motorcycle Safety & Awareness Month

Mayor Pruitt called forth several motorcyclists who requested this proclamation in recognition of Motorcycle Safety & Awareness Month. He then read and presented them with this proclamation, encouraging all drivers to be observant and respectful of motorcyclists driving on the roadways.

VIII. OPEN FORUM

Paul Davis (777 Paul Davis Lane) came forth and shared that he lives in McLendon-Chisholm; however, he owns property in Rockwall, including property on Cullins Road. Mr. Davis generally expressed opposition to the proposed zoning pertaining to case Z2019-005.

Don Braswell
2041 Chisholm Trail

Mr. Braswell indicated that he lives within the county, about 200' from the proposed zoning change (Z2019-005) and the proposed PID. He has concerns about the existing floodplain and how additional development, both homes and expansion of roadways, will adversely impact the area. Furthermore, he is concerned about the increased traffic and congestion as well as density, and reduced setbacks if this development comes to fruition. He encouraged the city to not allow this development, as it deviates from the city's 2040 Comprehensive Plan.

Leslie Wilson 535 Cullins Road Rockwall, TX

Mrs. Wilson expressed that a lot of people here tonight are frustrated because they have not yet gotten an opportunity to speak about the proposed PID and related zoning change (Z2019-005). She indicated that she and others will come forth later in the meeting, during the proper time, to share their thoughts.

Janice Morchower 144 Westwood Rockwall, TX 75032

Ms. Morchower came forth and indicated that she lives in Windmill Ridge subdivision. She expressed concern about the creek that flows into the park area. It serves as runoff for Ralph Hall Parkway, and

the creek is littered with trash and tall reeds. There are trees that are 'downed' in the park, and they have been like that for a while. The litter, she indicated, is inhibiting the water flow. Mayor Pruitt introduced Ms. Morchower to Andy Hesser, Parks Director, indicating that he is the proper staff person to address her concerns.

Ed Kohorst 831 Cullins Road Rockwall, TX

Mr. Kohorst came forth and indicated that he and his wife, Olivia, have lived at this location on fifteen acres for twenty-five years. It is a mixture of tall grass, dense woods and gently rolling hills. He spoke about the many different variations of wildlife that live in and around his property and the creek that runs less than 50 yards from the western edge of the proposed Highgate development. He believes that this development will cause the creek to overflow its bank, flood the nearby wooded area and destroy the wildlife habitat that live there. He generally expressed concern about this development potentially being approved by the City.

Kristi Mase 1160 Skylar Drive Rockwall, TX 75032

Ms. Mase indicated that she worked as an Admin. Assistant at Rockwall High School, and students often sit on the floor in the lunch room because of overcrowding. She believes these 500+ homes will further adversely impact overcrowding that is already present within the school district.

Craig Koziol 281 Willowcrest Rockwall, TX

Mr. Koziol came forth and expressed that he is adamantly opposed to the proposed zoning change associated with the potential Highgate development.

Prycilla Bento 2002 S. Lakeshore Drive Rockwall, TX

Mrs. Bento came forth and shared concerns related to unsustainable development and "urban sprawl." She expressed concerns about traffic, flooding, infrastructure, and school overcrowding, among other things.

Mayor Pro Tem Fowler moved to approve the entire Consent Agenda (#1, 2, 3, 4, and 5). Councilmember Macalik seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays. Mayor Pruitt then reordered the agenda to address Appointment Item #2.

X. APPOINTMENT ITEMS

1. Appointment with the Planning and Zoning Chairman to discuss and answer any questions regarding cases on the agenda and related issues and take any action necessary.

Chairman of the city's Planning & Zoning Commission, Johnny Lyons, came forth and briefed the Council on recommendations of the Commission regarding planning-related items on tonight's meeting agenda. Following brief, clarifying discussion, Council took no action related to this appointment item.

2. Appointment with the Lakeshore Composite Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol to report on community activities for the 2018-2019 school year, and take any action necessary.

Representatives from the local Civil Air Patrol squadron came forth and briefed the Council on community-related activities that the group either spearheaded or was involved in during the year 2018. Following their brief presentation, Mayor Pruitt thanked the group for all the good its members do within our community.

XI. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Kent Donahue of Donahue Development Corporation on behalf of the owner Rockwall Highgate LTD for the approval of a Public Improvement District (PID) on a 264.510-acre tract of land identified as Tracts 17-13 [50.0-acres], 17-14 [26.452-acres], 17-15 [134.33-acres], 17-16 [43.6-acres], & 40-8 [8.79-acres] of the W. W. Ford Survey, Abstract No. 80, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Agricultural (AG) District, located on the east side of SH-205 (S. Goliad Street) south of the intersection of SH-205 and FM-549, and take any action necessary.

City Attorney Frank Garza provided a briefing regarding how a PID petition request must be handled and how PID assessments and associated fees/taxes work. It is required that a public hearing be held by city council after receipt of a legitimate PID petition. The proposed district boundaries must be identified along with a PID petition, and this one does identify those. The lots within the PID would be charged / assessed fees in an amount up to \$17 million to pay for the needed public improvements. The city will have up to six months to either accept or decline the PID.

Mayor Pruitt thanked Mr. Garza for his briefing and associated explanations. Mayor Pruitt shared that this development is actually a proposed 2 units per acre, and "low density" is actually defined as 2.5 units per acre within the Hometown 2040 Comprehensive Plan. He went on to explain that the city's comp plan was approved after a two year process that included a lot of public input opportunities.

Mr. Donahue 15443 Knoll Trail, Suite 130 Dallas, TX 75248

Mr. Donahue came forth and shared that he would like to delay the PID presentation until May to allow additional time for him to meet with and work with citizens to address their concerns. Mayor Pruitt shared that he and the council members are not going to accommodate his request to delay this topic. Mayor Pruitt invited Mr. Donahue to proceed with his presentation regarding the PID; however, Mr. Donahue gave indication that he was choosing to not proceed with making said presentation.

At the request of Councilman Johannesen, Mr. Garza clarified that this PID petition does not ask or require the city to pay for any aspects of the public improvements. The city would in no way be liable to repay the PID bonds that are issued – only the property owners within the PID would be "on the hook" for repayment of the public improvements.

Craig Koziol 281 Willowcrest Rockwall, TX 75032

Mr. Koziol came forth and asked Mr. Garza, City Attorney, if this development would cause property taxes to increase for those homeowners who do not live within the development. Mr. Garza indicated that no, they would not.

Thomas Cosby

2025 Chisholm Trail Rockwall, TX 75032

Mr. Cosby shared that he believes the density of this area should match that of the adjacent homes already in existence. He believes the infrastructure should already be in place before the homes are built. He is generally opposed to this request.

Karen Cosby 2025 Chisholm Trail Rockwall, TX 75032

Mrs. Cosby came forth and shared that she is generally opposed to this PID request. She believes that the integrity of the adjacent homes around the area would be negatively impacted.

Leslie Wilson 535 Cullins Road Rockwall, TX

Mrs. Wilson shared that she has lived at this location for almost twenty-two years, and her property is very special to her and her family. She is concerned about her home and property potentially ending up being backed up to homes with this type of density. She is strongly opposed to approval of this PID.

Dennis Hillery 143 Pelican Cove Rockwall, TX

Mr. Hillery came forth and shared that he has some concern about the financing. He asked for clarification on the bonds, pointing out that it would be \$17 million, plus the cost of the bonds, plus interest over a 30 year period. The mayor indicated that a lender would issue the bonds, and the land itself would secure the bonds.

Aaron Bruning 2002 Chisholm Trail Rockwall, TX

Mr. Bruning shared that his property is adjacent to this proposed PID. He pointed out that this developer has been in the news recently for some things that have occurred in the city of Rowlett. He encouraged the Council to consider those things when deciding on this proposal. Also, he has concerns about traffic and associated accidents. He believes that increased traffic causes concerns for emergency responders by hindering their ability to reach those who have called for assistance, especially the aging population.

Howard Haddock 155 Willowcrest Rockwall, TX

Mr. Haddock shared that he and many others are adamantly opposed to this development, as the lots will be 'postage stamped' lots. He strongly urged the Council to reject this proposal.

Olivia Casey 831 Cullins Road Rockwall, TX

Mrs. Casey came forth and expressed concern about potential approval of this PID request. She believes the cost for the property owners who will eventually live there and be taxed will be too costly. She believes establishing this PID will set a dangerous precedence. It sounds like corporate welfare, and she is strongly opposed to it.

Bob Wacker 309 Featherstone Drive Rockwall, TX

Mr. Wacker came forth and indicated that he served on the council appointed committee that reviewed and updated the city's comprehensive plan. He apologized for potentially having misled some of the people with whom he has communicated on social media (i.e. "Next Door"). He went on to share a story about a personal experience he had with his own homeowners association having to pay back a notably smaller loan within the Stonecreek subdivision. He indicated that the loan essentially cost each homeowner about \$1800 to pay back. He pointed out that the \$17 million loan associated with this PID will be exponentially more costly.

Joan Haddock 155 Willowcrest Rockwall, TX

Mrs. Haddock indicated that she prefers horses over houses (as far as what is located next door to her). She went on to quote a phrase from the city's 2040 Comprehensive Plan that generally states that a development should be equal to or of higher quality to the existing, surrounding area.

Scott Harman 280 Willowcrest Rockwall, TX

Mr. Harman is concerned about the area that is located within the floodplain within this proposed development.

Councilman Hohenshelt interjected and clarified that the density of this proposed development is within the city's zoning requirements, and the developer could – by right – build this subdivision even without the PID being approved.

Mr. Harman shared that he has concerns about the higher density development eventually costing school district taxpayers more money in school district taxes and taxes over all (i.e. additional fire, police and emergency personnel). He would love for this area to remain a horse farm forevermore; however, he and others do realize that at some point the property will likely be developed.

Carol Byrd 707 Cullins Road Rockwall, TX Mrs. Byrd shared that she has lived at this location for more than thirty years, and she moved here from north Dallas. She believes that some of how the city is growing is good (i.e. medical facilities), but some of the growth concerns her and makes her sad. She is concerned about the 'run off' that she has continually experienced on her property, stating that her barn and driveway have been flooded out several times. She urged the Council to consider the type of development that residents would like to see and not see.

Leslie Hope 530 Cullins Road Rockwall, TX

Ms. Hope shared that she and her husband moved here in 2016. She has concerns about 545 homes potentially being constructed in this area, especially when there will only be two-lane roads to travel. She worries that Cullins Road might be a means for ingress and egress pertaining to this subdivision. She and everyone else who has spoken this evening are opposed to this PID and this subdivision. James Nichols

241 Willowcrest Rockwall, TX

Mr. Nichols shared that he is fairly new to Rockwall and moved here about two years ago from Dallas. He is concerned that there are no pedestrian walkways in and around this area, and that is especially concerning as it pertains to a future park in this area.

Mayor Pruitt pointed out that the citizens of Rockwall approved the purchase of a "south" community park several years ago on a bond election.

Ed Burzair 2175 Arrowhead Court Rockwall, TX

Mr. Burzair pointed out that this developer would still need approval from both the Planning & Zoning Commission and the Council if this subdivision were to come to fruition. He believes that the PID is not even necessary, as the developer could just roll in the cost of the infrastructure into the cost of the homes/lots.

Sergio Bento 2002 S. Lakeshore Drive Rockwall, TX

Mr. Bento shared a story about his experience with Globe Life Park in Arlington and concerns related to that developer. He generally expressed the belief that the developer not giving his presentation this evening signifies a certain level of disrespect because it disallows those in attendance this evening to hear and see – 'straight from the horse's mouth' – what is being proposed. He is generally strongly opposed to this PID and this proposed development.

Stan Jeffus 1903 S. FM 549 Rockwall, TX Mr. Jeffus came forth and shared concerns related to this proposed PID. He does not believe that this proposal is in line with the true intent and design of a "PID." He believes the developer is 'taking advantage" by proposing this PID.

Jennifer Drake 205 Darrin Drive Rockwall, TX

Ms. Drake came forth and shared that she is a realtor, and she hears about a lot of homebuyers not understanding that they are buying in a "MUD" or a "PID," and they end up not being able to afford their home(s) over time. She has seen developers throwing in a lot of 'incentives' – for example, free washer and dryers – to encourage buyers to buy within a PID or a MUD. She believes this is deceiving to home buyers. She has a lot of concerns if this PID were to be approved, and she generally spoke in opposition of its approval.

Janice Morchower 144 Westwood Rockwall, TX

Ms. Morchower shared that she is a realtor too, and she also has concerns about this PID being approved. She wonders if a traffic impact analysis (TIA) will be required associated with this proposed development. Indication was given that before the Planning & Zoning Commission takes action on the zoning case, the TIA would have to be completed and the results shared.

Carol Gardner 759 Winding Ridge Lane Rockwall (County)

Mrs. Gardner expressed concern about additional noise that will accompany this development if this PID is approved. She also has concerns about Mr. Donahue not presenting this evening.

Dan Bobst came forth and shared that this gentleman is not being transparent, as evident by him not presenting this evening. He does not believe the Council should approve something from someone who is not being transparent.

Cody Barrick 5459 S. FM 549 Rockwall, TX

Mr. Barrick has not been real familiar with a PID prior to this case; however, now that he knows more about it, it appears to him to be a form of 'taxation without representation.' He is opposed to approval of this PID. He knows that development will likely happen in the future

Mayor Pruitt moved to deny this PID request. Councilman Johannesen seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

Mayor Pruitt called for a break, recessing the public meeting at 7:59 p.m. and reconvening it at 8:13 p.m.

2. P2019-013 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Dean Cathey of Dean Cathey Custom Homes, Inc. for the approval of a replat for Lots 3, 4 & 5, Block A, Richard Harris Subdivision No. 3 Addition being a 0.57-acre tract of land identified as Lots 1 & 2, Block A, Richard Harris Subdivision No. 3 Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Single Family 7 (SF-7) District, addressed as 705 & 707 Hartman Street, and take any action necessary.

Planning Manager David Gonzales briefed the Council on details pertaining to this request for a residential replat. Twenty-nine notices were sent out to adjacent property owners within 200', and one reply in favor and one reply in opposition have been received back by staff.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak. There being no one indicating such, the then closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to approve this request (P2019-013). Mayor Pro Tem Fowler seconded the motion. Councilman Trowbridge pointed out that approval of this type of request leads to more density within the downtown historic district. The motion passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

3. Z2019-005 Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Kent Donahue of Donahue Development Corporation on behalf of the owner Rockwall Highgate LTD for the approval of an ordinance for a zoning change from an Agricultural (AG) District to a Planned Development District for Single Family 7 (SF-7) District land uses on a 264.510-acre tract of land identified as Tracts 17-13 [50.0-acres], 17-14 [26.452-acres], 17-15 [134.33-acres], 17-16 [43.6-acres], & 40-8 [8.79-acres] of the W. W. Ford Survey, Abstract No. 80, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Agricultural (AG) District, located on the east side of SH-205 (S. Goliad Street) south of the intersection of SH-205 and FM-549, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Following brief, clarifying comments from the city attorney, Mayor Pro Tem Fowler moved to postpone this item until the May 20 city council meeting. Councilman Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 in favor with 1 against (Pruitt).

4. **Z2019-006** - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Mark W. Pross of Pross Design Group, Inc. on behalf of Carolina Molina of Alvaplast US (SPR Packaging) for the approval of an **ordinance** for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) allowing a structure that exceeds 60-feet in a Light Industrial (LI) District on a 42.61-acre tract of land identified as Tract 7 of the N. Butler Survey, Abstract No. 20 (11.3736-acres); Tract 31 of the R. Ballard Survey, Abstract No. 29 (8.197-acres); and, Lot 1-01, Block 1, Indalloy Addition (14.53-acres), City of Rockwall,

Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Light Industrial (LI) District, situated at the terminus of Aluminum Plant Road, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Manager, David Gonzales provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. The subject property is a 42.61-acre tract of land located at the terminus of Aluminum Plant Road, which is located at the southwest quadrant of the intersection of East Washington Street and Airport Road. The property was annexed on February 7, 1983 by Ordinance No. 83-06. According to the City's historic zoning maps, the subject property has been zoned Light Industrial (LI) District since at least May 16, 1983. In January 2019, the applicant, Carolina Molina of Alvaplast US, Inc. (SPR Packaging), requested approval of a site plan for the purpose of expanding SPR's existing operations. This request was for the first phase of a multi-phase expansion plan. On March 18, 2019, the Planning and Zoning Commission approved the requested site plan [Case No. SP2019-004] for Phase 1 for the purpose of constructing an approximately 78,615 SF single-story, warehouse facility (i.e. SPR Packaging) on an 11.3736-acre portion of the subject property. Currently, the subject property is vacant with the exception of Columbia Extrusion Corporation's existing structures located on the west side of the subject property (i.e. 8.97acre portion). The applicant, Mark Pross of Pross Design Group, has submitted a request for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) to allow for structures exceeding 60-feet in height to be located within a Light Industrial (LI) District. The applicant is requesting to allow for a maximum overall height of 100-feet for structures (i.e. high bay extruders) that will be located in the areas identified as Phases 2, 3, 4 and 5 as depicted on the concept plan (i.e. Exhibit 'B') contained in the draft SUP ordinance. This area will house the high bay extruders necessary for SPR's business operations. The applicant has stated to staff that SPR's business involves the production of flexible packaging products through a process called extrusion. The extrusion of certain plastics require additional height to process, and SPR has set a maximum height of 100-feet from grade for these structures.

Ninety-nine notices were mailed out to property owners located within 500' of the property, and the Park Place HOA was also notified. Staff has received six notices and three emails in favor of the request, two notices and two emails opposing it and one email that appeared 'undecided' regarding the request.

The president of SPR - Ignacio Echavarri 1480 Justin Road ((on behalf of) the applicant) - came forth and addressed the Council concerning this request for an SUP. He shared that his company has been in Rockwall for nearly eleven years. He went on to explain the expansion of his company outside of Europe (Spain), starting in 2014, through purchase of the SPR company in Rockwall. He explained that the company previously acquired adjacent land for future expansion. The company plans for expansions once every eight to ten years since the company continues to grow (it had fifty employees when first acquired, but it will soon have over 200 employees). He wants to expand while also being respectful of neighbors.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing. Following clarification from the city attorney pertaining to the potential conditions associated with approval of this SUP, he asked if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time.

Jean Conway 435 Jordan Farm Rockwall, TX

Ms. Conway came forth and shared that SPR has been a really good neighbor, and they have tried to accommodate height limits and minimize any negative, visible sight lines. She cautioned Council that

approving this request may set a precedence if and when other, similar requests come forth in the future, perhaps elsewhere in the city.

David 1020 Saint Charles Court Rockwall, TX

Mr. David expressed that he lives in the Park Place subdivision. He has done a lot of research and study on SPR and how these structures may visually impact 'line of sight' for him and others in his neighborhood. He explained that SPR has been a good neighbor in many ways. However, he does have some concerns about this particular request. He pointed out that, eventually, what SPR is requesting (including future expansions) will result in structures that span about 1,000 feet in length. And, eventually, said structures will visually impact Park Place. He encouraged Council to only approve what they intend to build currently and then consider future expansion requests and future high structures when the time comes, at a later date.

Bill Bricker 505 Westway Drive Rockwall, TX

Mr. Bricker came forth and expressed that he has been part of this plant since 1981. It has been there since the 1950s and was officially zoned in 1983. Columbia previously owned the plant, and he is responsible for this company and others. He indicated that he sold previous ownership of this plant to SPR, and he manages leases of the buildings in and around this area. He clarified that his comments tonight are his own, and they are not representative of SPR, Columbia or any other company. He indicated that when he sold the company, he went to great effort to ensure that SPR would be a good neighbor. He shared that SPR has no emissions and no noise, and they've committed to stay 500' away from the edge of the Park Place subdivision. He was initially alarmed about the proposed 100' height; however, he thereafter studied the sight lines, and he does not believe it will be an egregious view. He went on to generally express that he does not have great concerns about approval of this request.

Phillip Wagner of the Rockwall Economic Development Corporation came forth and shared that the impact of the height of the structures will be minimal. He went on to share brief details pertaining to the economic benefit and taxable value that will be associated with this expansion, both of which he feels merit consideration by the Council. He is generally in support of the Council approving this request. He went on to briefly explain the incentive that SPR may be able to receive (5-6% of the total investment).

There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak, Mayor Pruitt then closed the public hearing.

Following additional, lengthy discussion, Councilmember Daniels moved to approve Z2019-006. Councilman Hohenshelt seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

The motion passed by a vote of 5 ayes with 2 nays (Trowbridge and Macalik).

5. Z2019-007 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Ruben Garcia and Brandon Mullins on behalf of Forrest B. Davis Jr. for the approval of an ordinance for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) allowing outdoor commercial amusement/recreation in conjunction with an existing Craft/Micro Brewery on a 1.215-acre parcel of land identified as Lot 1-F, Bodin Industrial Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Light Industrial (LI) District, situated within the IH-30 Overlay (IH-30 OV) District, addressed as 2015 Kristy Lane, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Manager, David Gonzales provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. The applicants, Ruben Garcia and Brandon Mullins, have submitted a request for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) to allow a *Commercial Amusement/Recreation* (*Outdoor*) land use in conjunction with an existing craft/microbrewery located within a Light Industrial (LI) District. The applicant is requesting to operate an outdoor entertainment area that includes a stage and seating areas. This will be located at the rear of the property and will be enclosed by an eight (8)-foot wooden fence. Notices were sent out to 27 property owners within 500' of the subject property owners. Staff received two notices in favor of the request.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he closed the public hearing. Councilman Trowbridge moved to approve Z2019-007 as recommended by the P&Z Commission and including staff recommendations. Councilman Daniels seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

The motion passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

6. Z2019-008 - Hold a public hearing and consider a request by James Ziegler of PegasusAblon on behalf of Rockwall Rental Properties, LP for the approval of an ordinance for a PD Development Plan amending Ordinance No. 17-64 and in accordance with Ordinance No. 17-22, for a 7.344-acre tract of land identified as Lot 9, Block A, Harbor-Rockwall Addition and Tract 16 of the M. J. Barksdale Survey, Abstract No. 11, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Planned Development District 32 (PD-32), situated within the IH-30 (IH-30) Overlay District, located at the southwest corner of the intersection of the IH-30 frontage road and Lakefront Trail, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Manager David Gonzales provided background information concerning this agenda item. On June 17, 2013, the City Council approved a PD Development Plan (Ordinance No. 13-16) allocating 399 urban residential units (i.e. condominiums) to the subject property. These units were tied to a concept plan that showed two (2) condominium buildings being constructed on the subject property, one (1) adjacent to Lakefront Trail consisting of 349-units and one (1) adjacent to the Harbor Fountain consisting of 50-units. In addition, the plan indicated two (2) retail/restaurant strip centers would be constructed adjacent to Lake Front Trail and Harbor Heights Drive. These areas were eventually developed with a hotel (i.e. Spring Hill Suites) in 2016. On December 18, 2017, the City Council approved an amendment to this plan allowing the number of units to be increased to a total 450-units, which would increase the number of units for the building adjacent to Lakefront Trail to 375-units and for the building adjacent to the Harbor Fountain to 75-units. In addition, the City Council added a strict construction schedule for both buildings as part of the PD Development Plan ordinance. If the dates in the construction schedule are not met, the increased units (the additional 51-units) would be clawed back through an expiration clause in the ordinance. The owners of both properties agreed to the construction schedule as part of this case. On March 15, 2019, the applicant submitted an application requesting to amend the PD Development Plan approved under Ordinance No. 17-64. The applicant has stated that the purpose of this application is to [1] change the pedestrian access easement that extends from Lakefront Trail to the Harbor Fountain to a one-way private drive and pedestrian access easement, and [2] to change the construction schedule for Harbor Village project (identified as Building 10 in the draft ordinance). Forty-one notices were mailed to property owners located within 500' of the property, and two nearby HOAs were notified as well. Staff has received no notices back concerning this request. On April 9, 2019, the Planning and Zoning Commission approved the applicant's request to amend the Development Plan contained in Ordinance No. 17-64 by a vote of 5-2, with Commissioners Logan and Womble dissenting.

Jim Ziegler 6205 Wichita Trail Flower Mound, TX Mr. Ziegler came forth and answered brief, clarifying questions from the Council. Thereafter, Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing. Mayor Pruitt then moved to approve Z2019-008. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

The motion passed unanimously (7 ayes, 0 nays).

XII. ACTION ITEMS

 Discuss and consider authorizing Dallas Skydive Center to perform a parachute jump in a designated area of Harry Myers Park as part of the Founders Day Festival, and take any action necessary.

Mayor Pro Tem Fowler moved to allow Dallas Skydive Center to perform this requested parachute jump at the city's upcoming Founders Day Festival. Councilman Johannesen seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

2. Discuss and consider a height variance request for a pole sign at White Tiger Taekwondo located at 55 East I30 and take any action necessary.

Building Official, Jeffrey Widmer, provided brief comments concerning this request. He explained that the applicant feels this business needs additional visibility since it sits so low down adjacent to IH-30. He pointed out that, in order to be approved, this request requires a ¾ majority vote of Council. Councilmember Daniels expressed concern about potential approval of this request, pointing out that other, similar variance requests have been denied by Council in the past (i.e. Applebee's). Some council members recollected, however, that some past applicants have in fact received height variance approvals along the IH-30 corridor.

Following brief discussion, Councilman Hohenshelt moved to deny the height variance request. Councilmember Johannesen seconded the motion, which failed by a vote of 3 in favor with 4 against (Macalik, Pruitt, Fowler and Daniels).

Councilman Daniels then moved to approve the height variance request for the pole sign. Councilmember Macalik seconded the motion, which resulted in a vote of 4 in favor with 3 against (Trowbridge, Hohenshelt, and Johannesen). Since this item required a ¾ majority vote of Council in order to pass, it is considered to have failed.

3. Discuss and consider an **ordinance** amending the Code of Ordinances in Ch. 44. Utilities; Article V. Water; Division 7. "Drought Contingency & Water Emergency Response Plan" for the purpose of repealing it and adopting the "Water Resource and Emergency Management Plan" for the city, and take any action necessary. (2nd reading)

See item #4 below, as the mayor chose to address them both at once.

- 58 do and the services they provide to citizens.
- 59 IX. OPEN FORUM
- 60 Mayor Pruitt explained how Open Forum is conducted, asking if anyone would like to come forth and
- 61 speak at this time.
- 62 Jim Turner, 1691 E. Old Quail Run Road, came forth and expressed concern over his recycling not being
- picked up four times in recent memory. He believes the city's recycling program has regressed. Also,
- 64 he has concerns about drainage issues that continue to get worse, especially in creeks and areas around
- 65 his property. He encouraged the city to put a comprehensive drainage plan together to mitigate
- drainage concerns and prevent future, potential dam failures. He believes the drainage concerns near
- 67 him currently only impact a small handful of properties; however, he fears the drainage problems will
- 68 eventually adversely affect the city as a whole.
- 69 There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak, Mayor Pruitt closed Open Forum.

Chairman of the Planning & Zoning Commission, Johnny Lyons, came forth and briefed the Council on recommendations of the Commission relative to planning-related items on tonight's meeting agenda. Council took no action as a result of this agenda item.

XII. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. Z2019-009 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Chris Lam, PE of Lam Consulting Engineering on behalf of Price Pointer of TCB Construction Group, LLC for the approval of an ordinance for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) allowing a restaurant less than 2,000 SF without a drive-through or drive-in on a 0.23-acre parcel of land identified as Block 20B of the Amick Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Planned Development District 50 (PD-50) for Residential Office (RO) District land uses, situated within the North Goliad Corridor Overlay (NGC OV) District, addressed as 505 N. Goliad Street, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Manager, David Gonzales, provided background information pertaining to this agenda item, indicating that Bonafide Betties Pie Company is currently located at 103 S. San Jacinto Street, but the business is planning to relocate to a larger facility at 505 N. Goliad Street. This location is within Planned Development District 50 (PD-50). The Residential Office (RO) District, which is the underlying zoning designation for Planned Development District 50 (PD-50), requires a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for a restaurant with additional restrictions that stipulate the restaurant be less than 2,000 SF and not have a drive-through or a drive-in. The proposed restaurant is a limited service restaurant, and parking for the facility will be calculated at one (1) parking space per 250 SF of area. This means the restaurant would require eight (8) parking spaces [1916 SF/250 SF = 8 Parking Spaces]. Based on size of the site and the area taken up by the existing single-family home, the applicant is only able to incorporate a total of seven (7) parking spaces on-site. Staff has included an operational condition allowing the reduced number of parking spaces. Staff has also included operational conditions requiring the

installation of a minimum six (6) foot tall, board-on-board, wood fence to be constructed along the western property boundary, floor be used only for storage purposes. These have been included as conditions of approval in the SUP ordinance. Staff mailed out 34 notices to property owners within 500' of the subject property. Staff received a total of four notices back and two emails in favor of the request. Also, the Planning & Zoning Commission has unanimously recommended approval of this request.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing.

Councilman Trowbridge moved to approve Z2019-009 with staff recommendations. Mayor Pro Tem Macalik seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

The motion passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

2. Z2019-010 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Dwayne Cain of EVSR (D), LLC for the approval of an ordinance for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) allowing a guest quarters/secondary living unit and barn or agricultural accessory building on a 10.61-acre portion of a larger 26.078-acre tract of land identified as Tract 2 & 2-4 of the W. M. Dalton Survey, Abstract No. 72, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Agricultural (AG) District, addressed as 777 & 839 Cornelius Road, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Manager David Gonzales provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. He explained that, currently, there is a single-family home on the subject property and the applicant is requesting approval of a Specific Use Permit (SUP) to allow a guest quarters/secondary living unit and barn or agricultural building in conjunction with this structure. The structure will be ~4,950 SF in total size, with ~576 SF being dedicated to the guest quarters/secondary living unit. The proposed building will be situated behind the main structure, have four (4) roll-up garage doors, and be clad with metal on the exterior. The proposed building will primarily serve as storage for vehicles/equipment and contain a small bathroom with a shower. He went on to share that on May 1, 2019, staff mailed 16

notices to property owners and residents within 500-feet of the subject property. There are no Homeowner's Associations (HOA's)/Neighborhood Associations within 1,500-feet of the subject property participating in the Neighborhood Notification Program. At the time this report was written, staff had received four (4) notices in favor of this request (all from Mr. Cain, as he is the owner of the surrounding properties). On May 1, 2019, staff mailed 16 notices to property owners and residents within 500-feet of the subject property. There are no Homeowner's Associations (HOA's)/Neighborhood Associations within 1,500-feet of the subject property participating in the Neighborhood Notification Program. At the time this report was written, staff had received four (4) notices in favor of this request.

Mr. Dwain Cain - 305 Stonebridge Rockwall, TX – (the applicant) came forth and provided brief comments pertaining to this request, generally asking the Council to act favorably to approve this request.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak. There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing.

Mayor Pro Tem Macalik moved to approve Z2019-010. Councilmember Daniels seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

The motion passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

3. Z2019-011 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Scott Lewis of RRDC, LTD for the approval of an ordinance amending the development standards contained in Planned Development District 47 (PD-47) [Ordinances 99-17 & 07-04] being a 14.4715-acre tract of land identified as Tract 104 of the E. Teal Survey, Abstract No. 207 and Lot 1, Block A, First Christian Church, Disciples of Christ Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Planned Development District 47 (PD-47) for Single-Family 10 (SF-10) District land uses, situated within the Scenic Overlay (SOV) District, generally located at the northeast corner of

the ordinance. These changes are as follows:

- 1) The minimum masonry requirement be 60% with all lap-siding being a cementitious fiber material (e.g. HardiBoard or HardiPlank);
- 2) The maximum lot coverage be 55%, and
- 3) Front-facing garages be allowed provided they are set back a minimum of 20-feet from the front facade of the structure.

On May 1, 2019, staff mailed 123 notices to property owners and residents within 500-feet of the subject property. Additionally, staff notified Spyglass Phases 2 & 3, the Rainbow Lakes, Chandler's Landing, and Foxchase Homeowner's Associations (HOA's), which are the only HOA's/Neighborhood Associations within 1,500-feet of the subject property and participating in the Neighborhood Notification Program. At the time this report was written, staff had received two (2) notices in favor, one (1) notice in opposition, and one (1) email in favor of the request, with the exception of the front-facing garages. In addition, the Planning & Zoning Commission has recommended approval of this item by a vote of 4 ayes to 1 nay (Womble).

Scott Lewis – 900 Heathland Crossing, Heath, TX – (the applicant) came forth and addressed the Council at this time. He went on to explain additional details and clarify the nature of this request.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this

Dennis Denney – 162 Meadowlark Circle, Rockwall, TX – came forth and indicated that he represents the First Christian Church (located at 3375 Ridge Road). He went on to provide brief comments pertaining to Ordinance 99-53, expressing that he does not want his church to lose the ability to operate 'as is.' Planning Manager David Gonzales clarified that nothing will be changing in this regard.

Bob Wacker – 309 Featherstone, Rockwall, TX – came forth and provided comments pertaining to this request. He indicated that when he served on the city's Comprehensive Plan Review Committee, he was generally against front-entry garages. He shared that, even with three car garages, people still park in driveways. He wonders if the garages could be pushed back another 5' from the front property line.

Jeff Macalik – 6102 Volunteer Place, Rockwall, TX – came forth and expressed concern about this request. He indicated that he is involved in the HOA of Chandler's Landing, and he does not believe the HOA would be in favor of some aspects of this request (however, the Chandler's HOA was not actually within the notification area associated with this application). He generally spoke in opposition of this request.

There being no one else indicating a desire to come forth and speak at this time, Mayor Pruitt then closed the public hearing.

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Councilmember Trowbridge suggested the Council consider limiting the front entry garages. He also believes the requested 'coverage' does in fact relate to density, and he generally has some concern about this.

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Indication was given that all of the lots are 80' lots. The applicant came forth again and answered several questions of Council (related to 'coverage,' square footage, lot size, setbacks, front entry garages, front facades, j-swing garages, etc.).

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Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to allow 40% front entry and 60% j-swing garages associated with this request. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 nay (Pruitt).

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Councilmember Hohenshelt then moved to have the PD amendment reflect a 55% lot coverage. Councilmember Johannesen seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 5 ayes with 2 against (Trowbridge and Pruitt).

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Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to allow the PD amendment for the hardiboard requirement, as presented (from 80% to 60%). Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 5 ayes with 2 against (Pruitt and Daniels).

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1. Discuss and consider a request from Casey and Andrea Burke for a special permit on a front yard fence to be located at 1406-A Ridge Road, and take any action necessary.

293 294 Building Official Jeffrey Widmer came froth and briefed the Council on this front yard fence request. He shared that no notices are required to be sent to adjacent property owners; however, the Burke's have

gone to their neighbors and have received indication that they do not object to this request for a front yard fence.

Dean Cathey - 3066 Rochelle Road – and Mr. and Mrs. Burke – 1406-A Ridge Road – came forth to speak to the Council. Mr. Burke indicated they have lived on Ridge Road for fifteen years. They recently built a new home, and the apartment complex across the street is causing car headlights to shine into their living room. For this reason, they are requesting approval of a front yard fence. They went on to further explain their request and show photos of the lot, the home, a shed on the property and the type of fence they are requesting to construct. The fence would be 8' tall; however, due to elevation abutting the street, it will actually appear to be 5' tall.

Mr. Widmer clarified that the city's current standards for front yard fences are 48" wrought iron on 42" wood fence heights.

Councilmember Fowler expressed concern that the proposed wood fence may make the home look like a 'compound.' Also, he fears that eventually every residential home along this stretch of Ridge Road may end up wanting to install a masonry or wooden front yard fence, and that may result in inhibiting lake views along that stretch of roadway.

Following the dialogue between Council and the Burke's, Mayor Pruitt waited to see if any member of Council wanted to make a motion pertaining to this request. No one offered a motion.

Mayor Pruitt then called for a break and recessed the public meeting at 7:36 p.m. He then reconvened the meeting at 7:43 p.m.

Mayor Pruitt asked if anyone would like to make a motion concerning this agenda item. Since there was no motion made, the item "died" for lack of a motion.

2. Discuss and consider bike lanes on John King Boulevard, and take any action necessary.

Indication was given that Councilman Trowbridge requested this item for tonight's agenda. He pointed out that John King is currently a city-owned street, and he wonders if John King has bike lanes currently, and if it will have bike lanes in the future once TxDOT takes it over.

In the interim, when TxDOT takes it over, there will only be two lanes at 12' each. The ultimate build out of this road way will have three lanes in both directions, and they will have a shared bike lane. The outside lanes that will be closest to the sidewalk will be 14' wide instead of 11' or 12'. Current TxDOT standards call for either a dedicated or a shared bike lane.

No action was taken concerning this agenda item and associated, brief discussion.

The motion passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

Regarding Consent Agenda item #2, Mayor Pruitt generally expressed concern about the city spending this much money on a study of this nature. Indication was given that this study, in part, is taking place in order to update the hydraulic study on the existing Squabble Creek Watershed. Ms. Williams, City Engineer, explained that this study will produce information that may be used, for example, by residents who would like to work with FEMA to be removed from the floodplain. This will help those individuals with their insurance premiums. Mr. Crowley further explained that this study will help determine if and how future structures or building will adversely impact the watershed. Mr. Garza, city attorney, indicated that the city could not require developers to do flood control in the future if our study is not up-to-date. Mr. Crowley shared that this type of study will eventually have to be done on each watershed within the city. Mayor Pruitt's concerns generally seemed to relate to the high cost of this study and his belief that the 'return' the city will receive will generally not justify the cost.

Councilmember Fowler moved to approve Consent Agenda item #2. Councilmember Johannesen seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 5 ayes with 2 against (Pruitt and Macalik).

The motion passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 against (Pruitt).

 Discuss and consider a request from Butch Clarke of Alpha Graphics and representatives from Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital for an approval of a sign plan located at 3150 Horizon Road, and take any action necessary.

Building Official Jeffrey Widmer provided brief, introductory comments concerning this agenda item. Mr. Clarke then came forth with a representative of Presby Hospital. They generally expressed that this updated, proposed sign is being brought forth so that the signage is more visible and in response to the hospital's campus, which has grown a lot since the hospital initially opened. Also, this updated signage aligns with Presbyterian Hospital's updated, new brand standards.

Mr. Widmer came forth and clarified what the city's current sign ordinance allows for regarding both signage that abuts a public roadway (an entry sign) and signage that is interior, located onsite (not adjacent to a roadway). City Manager Rick Crowley asked Mr. Widmer to walk the city council members through each of the proposed, eight signs so there is a clear understanding on what's being requested.

Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to approve the sign plan with the maximum height of each sign be granted at 10' tall. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

Mayor Pro Tem Macalik called the public meeting to order at 5:19 p.m. Present were Mayor Jim Pruitt, Mayor Pro Tem Dana Macalik, and Councilmembers Bennie Daniels and Kevin Fowler. Also present were City Manager Rick Crowley, Assistant City Managers Mary Smith and Joey Boyd and City Attorney Frank Garza. Councilmember John Hohenshelt was absent from the entire meeting. Councilmember Patrick Trowbridge arrived to the meeting during Public Hearing Item #1 at 6:15 p.m. as noted below.

Mayor Pro Tem Macalik then read the below listed discussion items into the public record before recessing the meeting to go into Executive Session at 5:20 p.m.

Councilmember Daniels moved to approve the entire Consent Agenda (#s 1, 2, 3, and 4). Councilmember Johannesen seconded the motion, which passed unanimously of those present (5 ayes with 2 absences (Trowbridge and Hohenshelt).

X. APPOINTMENT ITEMS

1. Appointment with the Planning and Zoning Chairman to discuss and answer any questions regarding cases on the agenda and related issues and take any action necessary.

Eric Chodun of the city's Planning & Zoning Commission came forth and briefed the Council on recommendations of the Commission relative to items on tonight's meeting agenda. No discussion or action took place following Mr. Chodun's briefing.

XI. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. Z2019-012 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Ryan Joyce of Michael Joyce Properties on behalf of Jen-Liang Wu of Unison Investment for the approval of an ordinance for a zoning change from an Agricultural (AG) District to a Planned Development District for Single Family-1 (SF-1) District land uses on a 61.45-acre tract of land identified as Tract 4 of the W. M. Dalton Survey, Abstract No. 72, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Agricultural (AG) District, located on the west side of Stodghill Road [FM-3549] north of the

intersection of Stodghill Road [FM-3549] and Cornelius Road, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. Specifically, the development will include 17 lots that will be a minimum of 120' x 200' and 23 lots that will be a minimum of 130' x 400'. Of the 40 proposed lots 39 of the lots will range in size from 43,560 SF (i.e. one [1] acre) to 65,340 SF (i.e. one and one half [1½]-acres). There will be one (1) lot that will be 235,299 SF (i.e. ~ five and one half [5½] acres). The proposed minimum size of each dwelling unit (i.e. air conditioned space) will be 2,500 SF. The applicant has stated that the homes will be custom homes and will vary from lot to lot. The product will also be a rural style estate lot, which will incorporate a rural-local roadway (i.e. will not be curb and gutter) and a minimum front yard setback of 70-feet. The proposed housing product will have a minimum masonry requirement of 80%, with up to 50% cementitious fiberboard horizontal lap siding (e.g. HardiBoard or Hardy Plan) and stucco (i.e. three [3] part stucco or a comparable product -- to be determined be staff) being permitted. The proposed housing product conforms to the City's minimum masonry and anti- monotony requirements and will allow both traditional swing (i.e. j-swing), side entry, and flat front entry (i.e. setback behind the width of the double car garage that is access from the traditional swing configuration) garage configurations. All garage doors will incorporate upgraded finishes (e.g. divided garage bay doors, carriage style hardware and lighting elements, cedar clad garage doors, or a similar alternative -- to be determined by staff). The development will incorporate less than the required 20% open space; however, it will have a 30-foot landscape buffer adjacent to FM-3549 that will incorporate ground cover, a built-up berm and/or shrubbery -- or a combination thereof -- and trees and a five (5) foot sidewalk along the entire frontage. In addition, the applicant has stated that by virtue of the development incorporating larger lots without stockade or solid fencing, it will achieve the same feel as more dense developments that incorporate the required 20% open space. The proposed Planned Development District will be subject to the land uses and requirements stipulated for the Single-Family 1 (SF-1) District unless specifically called out in the Planned Development District ordinance.

Mr. Miller shared that thirteen notices were sent out to owners and occupants located within 500' within the city limits. To date, staff has received no responses back. In addition, the Planning & Zoning Commission has recommended approval of this request.

Mayor Pruitt then opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time.

Ryan Joyce 1189 Waters Edge Drive Rockwall, TX 75087

Mr. Joyce, the applicant came forth and addressed the Council, explaining that this development was birthed when he and his wife were searching for a place to build a home on a 1 acre lot. He has been a developer for a number of years but mainly in Austin. He went on to share additional details pertaining to his proposed development.

Councilmember Trowbridge arrived to the meeting at this point (at 6:15 p.m. during Mr. Joyce's comments).

Steve Curtis 2130 FM 1141 Rockwall, TX 75087

Mr. Curtis came forth and expressed concerns related to drainage if this tract of land is developed.

City Engineer Amy Williams provided brief comments pertaining to drainage-related studies and requirements to which the applicant will need to adhere.

City Manager Rick Crowley commented that when the Council has previously approved 1 acre lots on septic, Rockwall County has indicated that the county may not be able to include new lots in the county's inspections program. He cautioned the Council that the city may need to develop its own inspection program; however, he does not believe this will be problematic or too concerning. He just wanted to make the Council aware of this possibility; however, he does not believe this should be a deciding or limiting factor in the Council's decision making this evening.

Councilmember Johannesen asked if the Council is only voting on zoning or if the plan itself is also being approved. Mr. Miller pointed out that the plan is included as an exhibit to the proposed ordinance.

Councilman Johannesen moved to approve Z2019-012. Councilmember Daniels seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

The motion passed by a vote of 5 ayes with 1 absence (Hohenshelt), and 1 not voting/abstaining (Trowbridge).

2. Z2019-013 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Jimmy Strohmeyer of Strohmeyer Architects, Inc. on behalf of Dan Bobst of J-BR2, LLC for the approval of an ordinance for a PD Development Plan within Planned Development District 32 (PD-32), on a 2.893-acre parcel of land identified as Lot 1, Block B, Harbor District Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, situated within the Hillside Sub-District of Planned Development District 32 (PD-32), located within the IH-30 Overlay (IH-30 OV) District, located at the southwest corner of the intersection of the IH-30 frontage road and Sunset Ridge Drive, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided background information concerning this agenda item. On May 15, 2019, the applicant -- Jimmy Strohmeyer of Strohmeyer Architects, Inc. -- submitted an application requesting to amend Ordinance No. 14-51 to change the PD Concept Plan approved for the subject property. According to Ordinance No. 17-22 [the regulating ordinance for Planned Development District 32 (PD-32)], the purpose of a PD Development Plan is to ensure that a proposed development meets the

intent of the subdistrict and/or to address any waivers required by the development. Ordinance No. 17-22 goes on to state that the Hillside Subdistrict, in which the subject property is located, is intended "... to provide a cluster of restaurant anchors that can contribute to the creation of a vibrant, pedestrian oriented character within the Harbor District." In this case, the applicants proposed development meets this intent of the Hillside Subdistrict; however, the submitted Plan will require waivers to the building placement and parking requirements stipulated in Ordinance No. 17-22.

Notices were sent out to property owners and residents located within 500' as well as the HOA's (homeowners association(s)).

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing. The applicant then came forth to speak.

Jimmy Strohmeyer 2701 Sunset Ridge Suite 607 Rockwall, TX 75032

Mr. Strohmeyer came forth and provided additional information to the Council concerning his requests. Council then spoke with staff concerning the parking requirements and associated waiver that is being requested.

Councilmember Trowbridge commented that he likes the slope and how this will cause this area to appear to "step down" as you approach IH-30.

Councilmember Fowler expressed some concern about the parking and patrons that will be walking uphill and downhill to and from the parking areas.

Councilmember Johannesen moved to approve Z2019-013. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

The motion passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absent (Hohenshelt).

XII. ACTION ITEMS

1. Hear update and discuss and consider city strategic planning, and take any action necessary.

Mayor Pruitt opened this discussion by sharing his thoughts regarding citywide strategic planning, including topics he believes the city should focus on moving forward throughout his last term as mayor. His comments were as follows:

I want to thank our Rockwall City Staff under the leadership of City Manager Rick Crowley for taking the City, over the past five years that I have been Mayor, to a new level of professionalism. I also want to thank my fellow council members who have worked tirelessly in making Rockwall not just a city, but a community. I look forward to serving you for my last term as Mayor of this dynamic growing community, and want to share some of my visions for the upcoming term.

FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY - We must continue to concentrate on fiscal responsibility that focuses on the growth in expenditures. Keeping expenditures in check will guarantee a tax rate reflective of the conservative views of this Council. I am proud that the tax rate in our City has decreased to the effective rate for each of the years I have been your Mayor and I am confident this will be the case again this year.

RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT -We should continue to encourage developers to increase the quality and size of homes on the remaining developable residential land in our city. Increases in size and quality of homes will add increased taxable valuation.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT - This city is committed to attracting quality commercial and retail projects. Our Economic Development Corporation must continue to attract great companies like the ones that now call Rockwall home.

Downtown is a phenomenal place to visit, not just for our residents, but it attracts many to come to Rockwall and attend one of the many events that takes place downtown each week. We must continue to support the Farmer's Market downtown where it has thrived for the past ten years. The San Jacinto Square downtown is a jewel and the concert series that takes place on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights should be expanded so as to have live music downtown each and every weekend.

The Harbor District has finally gotten on track and is developing into what was envisioned by its creation. Our City invested a large amount of tax money at the Harbor and I believe with the opening of the new condominium projects we will see the Harbor thrive. We have to do a better job in encouraging folks to park in the Trend Tower garage during events at the Harbor. Last Thursday the neighborhood above the Harbor was inundated with attendees parking all the way to the top of the neighborhood due to the large turnout, while the Trend Tower Garage was barely used. Signage must be changed that instructs people entering the Harbor that City parking is available at the Tower. Our taxpayers funded several million dollars for this garage and it should be used.

We also need to decide what are our long-term goals as to the sale or development of the additional property that the City still owns in the district and try to move beyond the barriers of the past. The Harbor is an asset that needs to be enjoyed by our residents. I would encourage our residents to rediscover the Harbor and see what a truly spectacular complex it is.

ROADWAYS/TRANSPORTATION - The council remains committed to improving roadways and transportation. We will continue to partner with Rockwall County to provide relief in this area. The I30 project for expanding the bridge over the lake is proceeding and I expect this project will be an economic game-changer for our City.

Likewise, the John King to State Highway 205 exchange with TXDOT is in the environmental stage and will have the necessary funding to be completed in a few years.

We must also be vigilant about making repairs to existing streets that have deteriorating concrete and asphalt surfaces which are constantly requiring temporary repairs. Planning for major roadway bond projects for rehabilitation of City streets is well underway.

PARKS - The Parks Department has exceeded our expectations and continues to make Rockwall a great place to live, work and play. We should all get behind and energize our efforts to construct a lakeside city park. We are a lakeside community and do not have one city park on the lake for our resident's enjoyment. It is time that we get with Dallas to lease the take-line in the North so we can complete this needed addition to our park system.

We are into a comprehensive study of our athletic facilities and soon we will need to consider what level of these facilities the City can afford.

I have already started a comprehensive assessment of our take-line ordinance. This ordinance passed many years ago does not address certain issues that have arisen concerning construction and access. We must encourage the owners living on the lake to lease the take-line from the City if they want to use it. Many property owners are using the take-line but paying nothing for that opportunity while others pay according to the ordinance. If these owners are not willing to lease the property, then our residents should be allowed to use the property for recreational purposes which are not now possible.

AIRPORT - We must concentrate on obtaining grant finding from TDOT Aviation to correct some serious problems at the Ralph Hall Municipal Airport. We are presently working to obtain land that is needed for these improvements. It is very important that we attract commercial aviation businesses to the airport. With the runway length being fixed, it is very challenging to attract commercial aviation. With the new technologies being developed, drone and helicopter businesses are the type of commercial aviation businesses that we can attract.

VOLUNTEERISM - I once again encourage each citizen to get involved in our City in one of our many volunteer opportunities. If you want to get involved in this city, we will do our very best to find you a spot that gels with your experience level, interests, or available time commitment. It doesn't matter if you have ever been involved before. If you want a voice in this city, come talk to us at city hall or go onto our website www.rockwall.com.

CUSTOMER SERVICE - Our city employees are our best asset. We are in a customer service business – whether you are the water meter reader or a patrol officer. We expect every employee to treat citizens with respect and to do their job as professionally as possible.

Again, I am so honored to be your mayor, and I look forward to working with each of you to keep this the best city in the State of Texas.

Following Mayor Pruitt's comments, City Manager Rick Crowley then came forth and addressed the Council. He provided extensive comments regarding some of the city's past strategic plan-related accomplishments and strategic items that the city may wish to focus on moving forward into the future. The Council took no formal action pertaining to this discussion item.

2. Discuss and consider overview of the city's budget process and outlook for Fiscal Year 2020, and take any action necessary

Assistant City Manager / Finance Director Mary Smith briefed the Council on the upcoming budget process and outlook for next fiscal year's budget. She pointed out that the city's effective tax rate may end up being just slightly higher than our current rate. So, keeping the effective tax rate may require a very slight rate increase. Department directors have submitted their budget requests, and city management is currently working through those requests in order to arrive at the ability to present a balanced budget proposal to the Council for consideration later this summer.

General discussion ensued pertaining to projected property tax values. Mr. Crowley indicated that staff will be preparing the budget proposal based on the current tax rate, and then staff and council will move forward from there with the budget process.

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This item was not addressed by Council / no action was taken.

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X. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

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1. MIS2019-003 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Jose Carmona Lopez for the approval of an On-Site Sewage Facility (OSSF) on a 0.33-acre tract of land identified as Lots 1325 & 1326, Rockwall Lake Properties Development No. 2 Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Planned Development District 75 (PD-75) for Single-Family 7 (SF-7) District land uses, addressed as 424 Nicole Drive, and take any action necessary.

Planning Director, Ryan Miller, provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. He explained that this property is located on the east side of the Lake Rockwall Estates subdivision along Nichol Drive. This street is not currently served by city wastewater service, and it is difficult to extend city service to this property. Notices were sent out to all property owners and residents located within 200'; however, no notices have been received back by staff.

- 151 Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time.
- 152 There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing.
- 153 Councilmember Trowbridge moved to deny this request. Mayor Pro Tem Macalik seconded the motion.

Lengthy discussion then took place among council members, generally related to the following: city wastewater services, any possible alternatives to this onsite sewage facility, and inspection of septic systems within the city (by Rockwall County, the entity that performs inspection services on behalf of the city). Mr. Crowley, City Manager, indicated that the county has expressed it will not inspect OSSFs on single lots; however, the County has routinely agreed to do inspections on septic systems within the city when they are installed to service more than one lot, specifically (and especially) in Lake Rockwall Estates. Councilmember Daniels sought clarification regarding if this is or is not an aerobic system. Mr. Miller shared that staff is uncertain, as the applicant has not submitted an engineer's report to the city (and is not required to do so until during the permitting stage). Lengthy discussion ensued among Council and staff pertaining to whether or not a lot of this size (so small) and with the soil type can accommodate a septic system. Indication was given that a septic system has to be stamped and sealed by a professional engineer. Councilmember Daniels expressed that he may like to see the Council table action on this item until staff has time to gather additional information and return to Council with a more professional opinion regarding if a septic system is or is not appropriate on these two lots (i.e. can the small size accommodate septic? Is the soil conducive to accommodating a septic system?, etc.). Councilmember Trowbridge generally expressed concern about approving this request, as he seemed to prefer that city wastewater be utilized instead of septic.

171 Councilmember Trowbridge withdrew his motion, and Macalik withdrew her 'second.' Councilmember 172 Hohehshelt then moved to approve MIS2019-003. Councilmember Fowler seconded the motion, which 173 passed by a vote of 4 ayes with 3 nays (Trowbridge, Macalik and Pruitt).

1. MIS2019-005 - Discuss and consider a request by Michael Duval of G & A Consultants on behalf of John Delin of R. W. Ladera, LLC for the approval of an Alternative Tree Mitigation Settlement Agreement for a 28.011-acre parcel of land identified as a Tract 5 of the M. B. Jones Survey, Abstract No. 122, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Planned Development District 85 (PD-85), situated within the 205 By-Pass Overlay (205 BY-OV) and the East SH-66 Overlay (E SH-66 OV) District, located at the northeast corner of the intersection of SH-66 and John King Boulevard, and take any action necessary.

Mr. Miller explained that this would be a gated, age-restricted community. He went on to explain the tree mitigation that is required, indicating that the applicant has expressed there is no space on site for additional installation of trees. This request went to the Planning & Zoning Commission, and a 5-2 vote effectively resulted in its denial.

John Delin of Integrity Group / R.W. Ladera came forth and provided comments pertaining to this request. Following extensive, lengthy discussion, Mayor Pruitt moved to settle the tree mitigation with a check to the City for \$50,000. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

2. Discuss and consider approval of a proposal from American Signal Corporation in the amount of \$117,693.28 for replacement of three outdoor emergency warning sirens, hardware, and software to be funded by general fund reserves, and take any action necessary.

He prefers to have the curb, the sidewalk and then the yard (and avoid having a small 1.5'-2' strip of grass).

Mr. McCallum came forth again and pointed out that if the roadway is not widened, the city may not even have to move the mailboxes.

Mayor Pruitt then read the below listed discussion items into the record before recessing the public meeting to go into Executive Session at 4:57 p.m.

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 Ms. Mayor came forth and shared that she installed a wooden retaining wall (2'x6's with metal posts) that is under 4' tall, and she did not realize that she needed to pull a permit until after she had already done the retaining wall. She pointed out that Rockwall is the only city that requires that a permit be pulled for a retaining wall under 4' tall. All other cities require a permit only if it is going be over 4' tall. She shared that she had a professional engineer sign off on the work that was completed to prove that it was well built. She explained that Ms. Harvey is a single mom, and this is why she opted to do a wooden retaining wall because it cost her about \$6,000 less to do wood versus stone or rock. She is wondering if there is some sort of variance process she may be able to go through in order to get the work that has already been completed approved and signed off on by the city. Also, she wonders why Rockwall is the only city around that requires a permit for 3' retaining walls and shorter when all the other cities are 4' or under for pulling a permit.

145 Judith Head146 203 Woodpark Lane

Rockwall, TX

She lives on a small street that has only eight homes on it, four on each side. She went on to express several concerns pertaining to the reconstruction of her street and the installation of sidewalks. A lot of homes have mature and expensive landscaping that will be adversely impacted. She believes that a study should be done in order to determine the need for sidewalks, especially because her street is so very steep. So, she does not know that sidewalks would even be necessary. She is concerned about future maintenance of the sidewalks, should they be installed. She has a petition that shows that 100% of the residents on Woodpark Lane are against installation of sidewalks, and they all do not believe it is necessary to rebuild the street either. She wonders if the curbs will be wheelchair accessible. Also, she wonders if an environmental impact study has been conducted regarding drainage, pointing out that their alleyway is more concerning than their street.

Debra Norton 1235 Ridge Road West Rockwall, TX

Ms. Norton shared that sidewalks do not create safety. They will be utilized for more than walkers and runners (i.e. scooters, bicycles, etc.), and that actually adversely impacts safety. She is concerned that the city is going to take 10' of her property, and she does not believe the city taking her property is right. She has been paying taxes for a long time, and taking her property would just not be right. She wants to see studies that show that sidewalks are needed, and she wants to see statistics that show that pedestrians have been hit or hurt without sidewalks. She wants the city to be sure that there is good reason to install the sidewalks. She believes that taking 10' of her property will result in her losing a good bit of equity in her home.

Mr. Wacker came forth and asked Council to explain to the public what their options might be concerning sidewalks (i.e. is there a variance they may be able to request?).

 Mr. Demarco shared that he and his wife have lived at this location for a relatively short period of time. He does not believe the existing roadway is that bad, and he does not believe the entire roadway needs replacing — only repairs are necessary, in his opinion. He generally expressed an indifference concerning sidewalk installation as part of the project; however, if they are installed, he prefers that the sidewalks be directly abutted to the curb/street (no grass strip in between the curb and the sidewalk). He acknowledged the understanding that it is public right-of-way, and the property does not actually belong to him, the homeowner; however, since he has been maintaining it, it sure does feel like 'his property' that is being taken.

There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak during Open Forum, Mayor Pruitt then closed Open Forum.

Councilmember Macalik moved to approve the entire Consent Agenda (#1, 2, 3, 4 and 5). Councilmember Hohenshelt seconded the motion. The ordinance caption for No. 2 was read as follows:

The motion passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

X. APPOINTMENT ITEMS

1. Appointment with Scott Self to hear proposal related to "4th of July" 2020 fireworks shows, and take any action necessary.

Scott Self

319 Harborview Drive

Rockwall, TX

Mr. Self came forth and proposed that five firework shows be done, simultaneously, at 9:30 p.m., each lasting for about 10 minutes in length. He pointed out that, although Harry Myers Park has been a good location for fireworks for a number of years, the adjacent property that has been used for years to park 500+ cars is being developed. So, the parking will be an issue. He went on to explain the five, proposed locations. He went on to share that the City of Heath is willing to partner with Mr. Self and the City of Rockwall, and they would have two (additional) fireworks shows, for a total of seven shows. He is coming forth now, in August, in order to seek approval of his proposal so that he can get to work quickly on obtaining and training lots of volunteers that would be utilized to help run these various fireworks shows. He explained that one advantage is that "point loading" would not be a problem, as crowds watching the fireworks would be spread out instead of consolidated in one location. He believes that this would be positively received by the public, and it could receive national recognition.

Mr. Self explained that the fireworks in these five shows would be about 3" in diameter versus the approximate 6" diameter of fireworks that are currently seen at the city's fireworks show at Harry Myers Park. He is asking for the City of Rockwall to finance \$20,000 for the five fireworks shows within the City of Rockwall, which is the same price the city is currently paying for the one show at Harry Myers. Mayor Pruitt expressed that if the city does not like the five, separate shows, then it could revert back to one, larger show like it has now in future years. Mr. Self concurred. Mr. Self shared that there will be some extra expenses, above and beyond the \$20k the first year, because – for example – he will have to purchase the barges from which the fireworks will launch the first year. However, he already has commitments from volunteers and those willing to sponsor some of the extra expense(s).

Councilmember Trowbridge acknowledged that things do essentially get bottlenecked when there is only one, single fireworks location. However, he wonders if five, separate shows will spread out the public too much. Mr. Self shared that some folks will be able to see two or three shows, simultaneously, all at once. He shared that the only other place in the nation that he's seen this done and done well is at the San Diego Harbor.

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> Councilmember Fowler shared that the city also has bands and other activities at Harry Myers on the 4th of July, prior to the actual fireworks show. So, he has concerns about losing some of those activities and camaraderie. He also wonders where some people may park to watch some of the five, separate shows.

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Mayor Pruitt asked how this would be marketed / advertised. He believes there would have to be indication given, within the marketing, to tell the public where to go in order to watch the show(s). Mr. Self shared that he does not believe these shows would be marketed to those living outside of the City of Rockwall - it will mostly be for the benefit of our own, actual residents. Mr. Self acknowledged the importance of having at least one of the five shows at Harry Myers.

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Mayor Pruitt and the Council provided informal guidance to Mr. Self and staff, instructing them to work together to come back to the City Council with a more detailed plan for moving forward with trying out this new idea for one year.

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ACTION ITEMS XI.

1. Discuss and consider providing staff direction to move forward with the following 2018 Roadway Bond Projects, and take any action necessary:

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a) Ridge Road West (Shores Blvd. to N. Goliad St./SH 205);

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b) S. Lakeshore Dr. (Summit Ridge Dr. to Tanya Ln) and Russwood Dr.;

295 296 c) Lakedale Dr., S. Lakshore Dr. (2000 block), & Woodpark Ln;. and d) Turtle Cove Blvd (RR tracks to Ridge Rd.).

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Mayor Pruitt began discussion of this item, sharing that a citywide ordinance was adopted years ago by a previous city council, and that ordinance called for sidewalks to be installed in all new neighborhoods and when existing roadways are reconstructed. He indicated that if the city residents do not want sidewalks, then the Council needs to hear that; however, if the ordinance is changed, it would apply citywide, as 'piece mealing' would not be plausible. He went on to share that a lot of forethought went into informing and educating the public on the bond election that was held and that the voters overwhelmingly passed last year. He went on to that the Council gets a lot of opinions from those who

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want sidewalks and also from those who do not want sidewalks.

Councilmember Hohenshelt addressed the policy related to installation of sidewalks, which he 306 mentioned was established about thirty years ago. All of the subdivisions built since that time have 307 had sidewalks installed to allow people who walk or run to enjoy them. He pointed out that there will 308 be dozens of projects like this over the course of the upcoming nine or ten years. So, whatever the 309 310 policy needs to be, then it needs to be decided now, and it needs to apply citywide. It will be too

challenging to address the issue of sidewalks with every single reconstruction project.

- 312 City Attorney Frank Garza pointed out that if the city does major reconstruction on a street that was
- built after 1992, then the city is required to put 'curb cuts' that are "ADA compliant," and this is
- regardless of whether or not sidewalks are installed on those streets.
- 315 Councilmember Fowler shared that perhaps the City should institute a policy that if reconstruction
- 316 happens on a street that already does not have sidewalks, then no sidewalks will be built; however, if
- 317 it is a new street or a new neighborhood going in, then sidewalks will be built. He went on to share that
- the Council has in fact received a lot of emails from residents who do in fact want the sidewalks built
- 319 along with these reconstruction projects.
- 320 Councilmember Macalik shared that, speaking as a realtor, younger families do factor in whether or not
- a neighborhood has sidewalks because they do tend to prefer there to be sidewalks. She understands
- 322 both sides of the issues; however, she believes that cities all over the United States are installing
- 323 sidewalks because they are quite popular.
- 324 Councilmember Trowbridge shared that this issue goes beyond those who actually live on a particular
- 325 street; however, he is also sensitive to the desires of a particular neighborhood.
- 326 Mayor Pruitt shared that he would like to have property owner feedback far before 40% of the design
- 327 engineering has already been complete and the money spent in that regard.
- 328 Councilmember Fowler asked if this is already a city standard, then why is it even being debated or
- 329 discussed right now? Mr. Crowley, City Manager, shared that the city always attempts to go into a
- 330 neighborhood to inform them about an upcoming reconstruction project. It is at that time, typically,
- 331 when feedback regarding sidewalks and other aspects of a roadway reconstruction project is heard.
- 332 Councilmember Johannesen expressed frustration because the city tries hard to be very transparent
- and communicate well with the public, and, unfortunately, residents don't seem to speak up until it
- 334 literally begins to affect their particular yard.
- 335 Councilmember Fowler shared that surveys showed that about 60% of residents indicated a desire to
- 336 have sidewalks on Ridge Road West, and about 40% indicated they do not want them.
- 337 Ms. Williams, City Engineer, explained that a machine runs along top of a roadway and analyzes its
- 338 structural integrity (not the 'driveability') and scores it as far as the need for it to be reconstructed (or
- 339 **not).**
- 340 Mayor Pruitt indicated that he will open it up for public comment to those who wish to come forth and
- 341 speak regarding "Ridge Road West" at this time. He first asked for City Engineer Amy Williams to speak
- 342 to the surveys that were sent out to property owners. Ms. Williams stated that there are sixty
- properties and sixty surveys were sent out to those property owners. The response rate was 37% (22
- were returned). Of those, 59.5% indicated they are "for" sidewalks and 40.5% indicated they are
- 345 "against" having sidewalks.

- Mr. Laws expressed concern about how much land is going to be taken away from the front of everyone's house. Regarding safety, he believes that once Ridge Road West is widened, people will drive along it at a faster rate of speed, and more people will be driving on it. He suggested that perhaps the city consider installing a sidewalk only on one side of the roadway or build the road (only) and not the sidewalks.
- Mayor Pruitt mentioned that the city has considered sidewalks on only one side of a road; however, he pointed out that the Council cannot get folks to agree on which side the sidewalk gets installed.

- 359 1230 Ridge Road West
- 360 Rockwall, TX

Mr. Demarco came forth and shared that everyone bought their home without a sidewalk, and they were ok purchasing a home without a sidewalk in front of it. Regarding safety, people's driving behavior tends to be related to the road and related conditions. So, he believes that a wider road will result in cars driving faster. He suggested that if they are going to be installed, perhaps Council could consider installing patterned sidewalks that are more beautiful or maybe use some of the money to add street lights.

Mrs. Barlow shared that she and her husband just purchased this home. She was not aware of the policy that is in place that calls for the same standards for street widths and sidewalk installations. She generally indicated that when a resident receives a survey, they are perhaps not understanding or are not aware that the street width will be expanded and installation of sidewalks will mean that part of their lawn gets 'taken in.' She is not in favor of 'one size fits all,' and she is in real estate. She believes that people make decisions on purchasing a home based on how the neighborhood makes them feel. She purchased this home, which was built in 1981, and moved out of a home that was built 10-15 years or so. She and her husband purchased the home because she likes the large trees, no sidewalks, etc. She believes that one policy, citywide, pertaining to sidewalks, is generally not feasible. She believes some sort of variance or exception needs to be made in this particular case.

Mr. Richmond shared that it was not clear that there could have possibly been an option for reconstruction of the street itself but with no sidewalk being added. He would like to see the roadway reconstructed, but he would like the sidewalks to be left out. He wonders if the homeowners along the

- roadway could get a variance to essentially 'skip the sidewalks.' He generally suggested that the Council
- 391 consider changing its policy regarding installation of sidewalks.
- 392 Mr. Crowley, City Manager, pointed out that a portion of a resident's yard is public "right-of-way," so
- 393 projects such as these do not take a person's property. The property line does not change, and the size
- 394 of the resident owned property does not change.
- 395 At 7:43 p.m., Mayor Pruitt called for a brief break and recessed the public meeting. Mayor Pruitt
- 396 reconvened the meeting at 7:55 p.m.

- 401 Mr. Sunderson shared that he does not live on this street; however, he is generally a proponent of
- sidewalks. He does not believe that sidewalks being installed on this roadway would detract from the
- beauty of the neighborhood. In fact, he believes that the sidewalks being installed would allow for
- 404 more pedestrians to enjoy the area. He believes the city's policy on sidewalks is fine 'as is,' and it does
- 405 not need to be changed. He reminded the Council and public that the Council is charged with
- 406 representing the entire city not just one street or one neighborhood.

- 411 Mr. Demarco came forth again and shared his belief that residents who filled out the survey and/or
- came to the informational resident meetings may not have totally understood about the street
- widening and that 10' of their front lawns would be 'taken in' as a result of sidewalks being installed.
- He suggested the city explain that better when sending out a survey. He understands that a portion of
- 415 their lawn is 'right-of-way,' but homeowners do not see it that way.

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- An unidentified resident came forth and shared that he was 50/50 on whether or not sidewalks should
- be installed. He did not realize, however, that portions of front lawns would be lost if sidewalks were
- installed. He did not understand what he was agreeing to and believes that several residents may not
- 420 have realized this either.

- 426 Mr. Boehm shared that he purposefully purchased a home nineteen years ago that did not have
- sidewalks on the street. He generally expressed that, since these folks purchased a home without
- sidewalks, it is not fair to them to now insist that they have sidewalks installed. He suggested the city
- 429 put a policy in place that if homes did not have sidewalks to begin with, then they will never have
- 430 sidewalks installed.

Ms. Goucher indicated that she agrees with the "no sidewalks" sentiments that have been expressed this evening. She thought there would only be 3', rather than 10', of the front of her lawn taken. She generally spoke against the installation of sidewalks.

Mrs. Solomon came forth and shared that she does not live on this road – she lives further down just a little bit in The Shores. She acknowledged the Council members are elected to represent all citizens and the city as a whole. She agrees the roadway needs to be reconstructed, and the curbs need reconstructing too. She suggested that parking be restricted on it and the speed limit be reduced to 25 mph. She wished Council the best in making this decision, as she generally knows this is a tough decision. She generally expressed concern about the survey that was conducted. She pointed out that the 'return rate' was low, and it is uncertain if the responses were from those who truly understood on what they were giving feedback.

Bob Wacker came forth and shared that he loves sidewalks, and he lives in the Stonecreek subdivision, which as sidewalks. He believes the city should move forward with installation of them in this instance. He suggested that staff try and communicate about these matters further in advance so that residents have additional time to consider these types of projects.

Mr. Richmond came forth again and suggested that the City consider re-surveying the residents along the roadway.

Councilmember Trowbridge made a motion to move forward with redesigning the engineering plans to remove the sidewalks along Ridge Road West. Councilmember Johannesen seconded the motion. He expressed concern about residents who have expressed support for sidewalk installation now possibly not being fairly represented (as the plan is perhaps now going to change without their input / knowledge). Following the discussion, the vote failed by a vote of 2 ayes and 5 nays (Macalik, Hohenshelt, Pruitt, Fowler and Daniels).

Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to approve the current design of Ridge Road West as presented by staff / the City Engineer. Councilmember Macalik seconded the motion, which failed by a vote of 3 ayes with 4 nays (Trowbridge, Fowler, Daniels and Johannesen).

Mayor Pruitt then took public comments concerning the S. Lakeshore Drive (Summit Ridge Dr. to Tanya Ln.) and Russwood Drive reconstruction project.

He generally expressed opposition to sidewalks being installed. He is concerned about the trees being adversely impacted by the sidewalks installation, and they will change the entire makeup of the neighborhood. He pointed out that there are at least a few, highly mature (30-40 + year old) trees that will be drastically impacted if these sidewalks are installed. He is generally in favor of the reconstruction and improvement of the roadway itself; however, he is greatly in opposition of the sidewalks. Even if the sidewalk is diverted around the mature trees, he believes the tree will be adversely impacted.

- Ms. Elwonger asked why a survey was conducted to begin with if a policy was already in place that
- called for sidewalks to be installed. Asking the question led responders to believe that their opinions
- would actually matter. City Manager Rick Crowley shared that it was actually his decision to include
- 525 the question about sidewalks because he anticipated that Council would like to have that feedback.
- 526 She generally indicated that she is strongly opposed to the installation of sidewalks. She purchased her

home without sidewalks and prefers that the street stay that way. She pointed out that the Council previously relied heavily on a survey the last time a decision was made regarding installation or no installation of sidewalks. In this instance, more residents (about 72%) have expressed "no sidewalks."

 Ms. Ingram came forth and suggested that Council consider changing the existing policy that calls for sidewalks to be installed upon reconstruction of a roadway. She did not know that 'new streets' would come with 'new sidewalks.' She believes that voters have been misled through the "sidewalks" question on the surveys. She believes a variance should be allowed in this instance because she does not know that voters understood (when voting on the bond proposal) that a new, reconstructed roadway would automatically be accompanied by the installation of sidewalks.

Councilmember Daniels shared that previously when Council asked the people on Summit Ridge to go discuss the matter and come back with a mutually agreed upon consensus, they were unable to do so. Daniels proposed that the city's existing policy be amended to state that if a street does not already have sidewalks, then it would not have new ones installed upon reconstruction....and if a street did have existing sidewalks, then new ones would be installed upon reconstruction.

Mayor Pruitt moved to table this entire Action Item #1 and further discuss it at a later date. Councilman Johannesen seconded the motion, which passed unanimously of those present (7 ayes to 0 nays).

Daniel Nichols of the Main Street Advisory Board came forth and provided a brief history to the Council concerning these proposed amendments. Mayor Pruitt indicated that he personally attended the Main Street Advisory Board meeting at which these proposed amendments were discussed. He shared that he has some concerns about some of these proposed regulations. He went on to share his concerns in greater detail. He generally does not feel like the city should be interfering to this degree with the signage that businesses want to install at their downtown buildings. Councilman Daniels pointed out

that some signage preferences are a matter of personal preference and/or opinion. Also, he agrees with the mayor that sometimes a city may be in danger of overstepping its bounds by overregulating.

At one point, Mayor Pruitt pointed out that the draft verbiage that calls for neon signs to be approved by the Main St. Advisory Board is not viable since that particular board is only advisory in nature. So, the city's Planning & Zoning Commission may be a better option since it is regulatory in nature (and perhaps the City Council could serve as the appeal authority).

Councilmember Hohenshelt generally expressed that if the vast majority of business owners are in favor of these sorts of regulations, then that is one thing; however, if more than half of them are not okay with these regulations, then that may be a different story.

Councilmember Fowler moved to table this discussion item. Councilmember Hohenshelt seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Trowbridge).

Mr. Crowley, City Manager, generally sought guidance regarding what type of additional information or steps are needed in order to revisit this topic at a later date. Councilman Hohenshelt wanted to be sure that anyone who may be impacted by these changes has been notified and invited to attend the meeting the next time this is discussed with Council. Crowley suggested that staff send another notice to all those property owners and businesses that were originally notified, remind them of the proposed regulation changes and invite them to the council meeting when it will be discussed. That way, they have an opportunity to either submit their comments in writing or attend the meeting in person if they so desire. Council generally seemed agreeable to this idea. No further discussion took place at this time.

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Mr. Grant came forth and asked for more information about plans for SH-205 where it exists going out of the city limits and in other areas along its route. Mayor Pruitt indicated that the city won't be bulldozing homes along the roadway near downtown like what TXDOT may have been proposing to do; however, the city will need to be innovative regarding how it will deal with traffic in that area in the future. Mr. Crowley shared that the \$44 million bond election related to John King Boulevard was put forth to voters in a way that indicated the future roadway would be utilized as a SH-205 bypass. He went on to further explain the history of the roadway construction as it relates to TXDOT standards when it was first built and afterwards. No action was taken as a result of the dialogue exchanged with Mr. Grant.

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There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak, Mayor Pruitt closed Open Forum at 9:41 a.m.

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III. HOLD WORK SESSION TO DISCUSS AND CONSIDER THE PROPOSED FISCAL YEAR 2020 CITY OF

35 ROCKWALL MUNICIPAL BUDGET

Mr. Crowley began the budget discussions, indicating that the proposed budget was prepared based on the effective tax rate of 38.7991 cents per \$100 of valuation. This will essentially result in a decrease of the tax rate itself. Staff has been able to begin transferring water / wastewater funds over to the General Fund to "pay it back," essentially. New state legislation will result in an estimated loss of about \$175k in franchise-related fees that will no longer be collected by the city. The sales tax rate increase is estimated at about 5.44%, as compared to an increase of 3% projected by the current fiscal year budget. In addition,

there will be added police and fire personnel as well as a four-person parks maintenance crew and water operations staff. There will be a market pay rate adjustment of 3% for non-sworn personnel and a 4% for some public safety positions to address market deficiencies and ensure internal equity in pay.

At 8:50 a.m., Pruitt asked if those present would like to hold Open Forum now or later in the meeting. A (then) unnamed gentlemen present in the audience expressed a desire to hold it after the budget discussions have taken place.

General discussion ensued pertaining to the budget, expenditures, and 'wants' versus 'needs,' including police department seized funds; use of funds for sidewalks (and associated citywide policy); the potential for an additional pickle ball court or two in the future; and possible additional parking at the Harry Myers Community Center/Pickle Ball Court/Park area. Discussions also took place regarding future, additional neighborhood parks and The Harbor 'beach park.' Councilman Trowbridge indicated a desire for staff to evaluate how our city's departmental and General Fund budgets compare to other, comparable, nearby cities (i.e. what percentage of our overall budget goes to Parks and Parks Maintenance and how does our percentage compare to that of other, similar cities nearby?).

Mayor Pruitt called for a break after Open Forum and recessed the public meeting (9:41 a.m.). He reconvened the meeting at 9:59 a.m.

IV. DISCUSS WATER / SEWER SERVICE AREA

Mr. Crowley discussed with the Council two residential developments north and south of SH-276 by the Rockwall Tech Park, indicating that they have a combined total of about 950 lots. He went on to discuss the future infrastructure needs of the city as related to these developments and future development elsewhere in the city. He talked about the potential of working with Fate, Wylie and Lavon to discuss the feasibility of joining together for a possible new sewer treatment plant sometime in the future, which may be the most financially viable thing to do. Discussions touched on a large, regional plant versus a 'package plant,' which is much smaller, and that may be a consideration too.

Mrs. Smith, Assistant City Manager/Finance Director, discussed with the Council the city's current water service area and the fact that the City of Rockwall has traditionally only serviced properties that are located within our own city limits. She explained that, in the past, when annexations have occurred, the City negotiates with those water supply corporations to buy the right to serve properties that have newly been brought into the city. However, recent state legislation that limits a city's ability to annex may pose a limiting factor in the future. She mentioned that Mt. Zion Water Supply Corporation may want the City of Rockwall to, over time, take over their system, indicating that our rates are about half of what Mt. Zion's current rates. Discussion took place regarding analyzing what the "cost of delivery" is to the City. Brief comments were made concerning other water corporations, such as Blackland, too. Council expressed that it is generally not opposed to the idea of the City of Rockwall potentially servicing water customers outside of our city limits / ETJ.

V. DISCUSS BEST PRACTICES FOR NETWORK SECURITY

Denny Lassetter, IT Director, came forth and discussed network security, including ransomeware threats that have been impacting computer networks of both private businesses and government entities. He went on to share some of the 'best practices' that are utilized in order to protect our own municipality's network from these sorts of hackers. He also provided numerous recommendations for how individual network and e-mail users may proactively work to protect the network too. Furthermore, he recommended that the same password never be utilized over multiple devices and accounts and that software always be kept up-to-date on mobile, tablet and desktop devices.

VI. DISCUSS FUTURE LEGISLATIVE PLANNING

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Mr. Crowley discussed this item with the Council. He briefed them on the role that the TX Municipal League (TML) has generally played on behalf of cities at the state legislature. In general, TML has taken the approach that if a piece of proposed legislation will support / enhance 'local control,' then TML has rallied for the bills, and if the proposed legislation generally aims to take away local control, it has taken a stance against said legislation. Mr. Crowley expressed that he would like to know if the Council is generally okay with him proactively working with other cities to encourage that they and TML begin to more solely focus on pieces of proposed legislation that truly, truly matter to cities. The Council was generally agreeable to Mr. Crowley doing so.

100 VII. DISCUSS FIREWORKS PLANNING

Mr. Crowley reminded the Council that Mr. Scott Self had recently spoken at a council meeting regarding the idea of having 5 lower level fireworks shows for this coming July 4th holiday – with 4 being over Lake Ray Hubbard / on the lake, and one being at Harry Myers Park (the typical location for the city sponsored fireworks show). Mr. Self wanted the city to financially participate to some extent, and he planned to recruit a lot of volunteers to train them and assist with 'pulling off' all of the proposed shows. Mr. Crowley indicated that staff recently met with Mr. Self, and the general gist of the conversation resulted in several 'unanswered' questions and/or several things for which no good, sound answers exist (i.e. from how far away might the 'lower level' fireworks be able to be seen?; where would people park and/or congregate to watch said shows?; will they be parking along IH-30 and/or in neighborhoods, some of which are gated, where residents may not appreciate them congregating to watch the fireworks shows? ; is it smart to change the "big show" at Harry Myers to a "lower level" show the very first year?, etc.). Mr. Crowley went on to share that his recommendation is that the city continue to pursue discussions with Mr. Self about the four, other lower level shows over the lake, that staff study (thru GIS mapping and analysis) how far away they will be able to be seen, and that the 'big show' at Harry Myers Park remain a 'big show,' at least for this first, upcoming year (and perhaps beyond). Council generally agreed with Mr. Crowley. It was also clarified that everything about the 4th celebration at Harry Meyers will remain unchanged (i.e. there will still be bands playing that day too).

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CALL PUBLIC MEETING TO ORDER

Mayor Pro Tem Dana Macalik called the public meeting to order at 4:02 p.m. Present were Mayor Pro Tem Macalik and Council Members Patrick Trowbridge, John Hohenshelt, Kevin Fowler, Bennie Daniels and Trace Johannesen. Also present were City Manager Rick Crowley, Assistant City Managers Mary Smith and Joey Boyd and the city's legal counsel, Patrick Lindner. Mayor Pruitt arrived to the meeting at 4:05 p.m. as noted below.

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WORK SESSION II.

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1. Hold work session to discuss sidewalks citywide

Mayor Pro Tem Dana Macalik read the work session agenda item and called upon City Engineer/Director of Public Works, Amy Williams. Mrs. Williams provided council members with samples of criteria that they may wish to consider when establishing a sidewalks policy. Mayor Pruitt arrived to the meeting at 4:05 p.m. Ms. Williams' criteria are as follows:

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- 1. The street is above a residential/local classification or on the currently adopted Thoroughfare Plan (i.e. minor collector, major collector, minor arterial and major arterial)
- 2. If average daily traffic is 1,000 vehicles per day or more
- 3. If a portion of the block of the street is within 1,000 feet of a school, city park, or church, the entire block shall have a sidewalk.

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Council discussed these three points at length with staff, generally clarifying the suggestions and trying to decide if the criteria are acceptable or if they may need to be modified in some way.

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Mayor Pruitt opened up the public forum

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Mr. Ruess came forth and expressed concern about not having heard the Council or staff mention anything about the home owners who have purchased homes along these roadways and what they may or may not want regarding sidewalks. He encouraged the Council to let the property owners vote and decide for themselves if they do or do not want sidewalks installed in front of their homes / on their streets. All he has heard so far during this work session is "bureaucracy." He personally does not want a sidewalk on Boydstun, and he does not believe they are needed on his street. He wants the Council to let the homeowners exercise democracy and decide for themselves if they will or won't

Ms. Ingram came forth and handed out suggested, proposed amendments for the current sidewalks-related ordinance. She too feels that property owners who live along these roadways should have more 'say' regarding if sidewalks will be installed or not. She shared that these suggestions came as a result of a group meeting of property owners on Lakeshore / S. Lakeshore.

Mr. Vanderslice came forth and shared that he has lived in Rockwall for thirty-six years. Back in April, he came forth and asked (at a meeting), are the sidewalks a "done deal?" He did not get a good feeling about the answer(s) received at that time. So, he went back and looked at his own survey to see how he had responded. He shared that when the bond description was sent out in a city brochure, indication was given that the city would work with the neighborhoods and that sidewalks were 'possible.' He does not understand why residents were even sent a survey asking if they do or do not want sidewalks if the schematics were already drawn up, and the sidewalks seemed to have been a "done deal" already by the time the neighborhood meeting was held. He suspects that if another, additional survey was sent, the city would receive an overwhelming response because, at this point, they are more educated on the subject of sidewalks. He does not believe that the city is listening to residents who live on these streets, in these neighborhoods. Mr. Vanderslice went on to share that he and his neighbors would rather live with the street 'as is' and not have the roadway improved if it means that sidewalks will be installed.

Mrs. Elwonger acknowledged that Texas having the third highest pedestrian fatalities in the nation may not tell the whole story.

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Mr. Howard shared that he and his wife have lived here for only about 3 years. He walks every morning at 5:30 a.m. for about an hour. He and his wife are in favor of the sidewalks and the street improvements.

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Mr. Gilliland shared that his home would get 160' feet of sidewalk and retaining wall if the city moves forward with installation of sidewalks. He and his wife eat breakfast, and 6-8 a.m. in the morning is the prime time for pedestrian walkers. He would hate to make decisions locally for Rockwall based on statewide pedestrian fatality statistics. Mr. Gilliland commented and complimented staff member, Jeremy White, from the Engineering Dept. on his professionalism and assistance in providing information to several residents who asked him for assistance.

He believes more efforts are needed. He is not in favor of sidewalks, and they will adversely impact trees, lawns, etc. He is pleased with our police department and their enforcement efforts. He encouraged Council to 'do the right thing' for people who live in this community.

The motion passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

XI. APPOINTMENT ITEMS

1. Appointment with Mike Svetz of Pros Consulting to hear a presentation regarding the athletic field feasibility study, and take any action necessary.

Mr. Svetz came forth and provided a lengthy presentation to Council related to the results of the athletic field feasibility study that his company undertook on behalf of the City of Rockwall. Mr. Svetz indicated that he did present these findings to the city's Park Board as well. Indication was given that further discussions related to this study will be held at some point in the future with both the Park Board and the City Council; however, no action was taken at this time.

2. Appointment with Phil Wagner, President of the Rockwall Economic Development Corporation, to request an ordinance to limit on-street parking in the Rockwall Technology Park to no more than two hours, and take any action necessary.

Mr. Wagner came forth and generally expressed concern about parking shortages that exist in certain areas of the Tech Park. He seemed to indicate that the parking issues make it difficult to attract new businesses to the Park. Following Mr. Wagner's comments, Council asked staff to bring back an ordinance for Council to consider related to limiting parking to two-hours within the Technology Park. Council took no formal action at this juncture.

XII. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. Hold a public hearing to receive comments regarding the proposed FY 2020 City of Rockwall budget and tax rate, and take any action necessary

 Mr. Crowley, City Manager, shared that the proposed budget was prepared based on the effective tax rate. This means that the actual proposed rate for fiscal year 2020 will be less than the current fiscal year's budget. Both property values and sales tax have increased, and staff is anticipating continued

economic stability and health in the coming fiscal year. Mayor Pruitt indicated that a day-long budget session was held last week. Mrs. Smith, Assistant City Manager / Finance Director, shared that the proposed budget is available on the city's website on the Finance Department's webpage. She gave a broad overview of the high points of the budget, including a few new positions and capital purchases. She shared that the actual, final vote on the tax rate and budget will take place at the next, regular city council meeting later on in September.

Mayor Pruitt shared that the city will be adding one, additional police officer that will specifically help with mental health issues, including members of the public that the police interact with as well as training for police staff.

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Mayor Pruitt opened up the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. There being no one indicating such, he then closed the public hearing. No action was taken by Council at this time.

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372 XIII. ACTION ITEMS

1. Discuss and consider citywide sidewalks policy, and take any action necessary.

Mayor Pruitt shared that this is a continuation of the work session item that Council discussed at the 4 o'clock meeting. He went on to generally share that sidewalks address safety concerns, so there are certainly reasons for having sidewalks, especially when thousands of cars are traveling on some of these streets.

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Councilmember Hohenshelt assured the public that he has personally spent five to six hours of his own personal time and another twenty hours or so at various public meetings discussing the topic of sidewalks. He and other members of the Council have been dealing with the topic of sidewalks for several years. The Council is trying to balance interconnectivity of the city and certain neighborhoods and not just look at sidewalks in front of certain homes along certain streets. He pointed out that the land in question is a 'dedicated right-of-way' that belongs to the city. So, the city is not 'taking' anyone's land. Anything that the city disturbs has to be put back in place (i.e. mailboxes, sprinkler systems, etc.). Property owners' lawns will be impacted, regardless, even if no sidewalks are installed - even if only the roadway, waterlines and sewer lines are replaced. Trees may very well still be affected. He shared that he has received many emails from residents who do want sidewalks installed. Councilmember Macalik shared that this has been a tough decision and review for her personally. She remembers when this neighborhood (Ridge Road Village) was developed because she has lived in the area since 1961. She knows that many people who originally came to Rockwall and purchased homes in this neighborhood did so for the suburban lifestyle. She, on the other hand, does recognize that sidewalks may contribute positively to bringing a neighborhood closer together (i.e. kids having lemonade stands and kids learning to ride their bicycles on sidewalks). Sidewalks, according to a study she read, had a positive impact on residential home values by at least \$5,000. With that being said, there needs to be some 'give and take' on this topic. She and other members of the Council are diligently trying to figure out a way to create a 'win win' for everyone. She shared that she and other members of the Council have received many, many e-mails from members of the public who have young children - who maybe could not attend the evening meetings because of their kids - and, they are very much in favor of sidewalks.

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Councilmember Trowbridge shared that he, personally, has not heard any comments that would lead him to believe that putting cars and people in the same place is a safe, good decision. He went on to generally share that he and other members of Council have absolutely been listening to the citizens, namely through surveys and various public meetings that have been held. He does not believe that installing sidewalks around 80 year old trees will result in all of them dying – he pointed out that sidewalks were installed about eight years ago on Goliad, and those trees are still living.

Mayor Pruitt summarized that the Council needs to decide how it will choose whether or not sidewalks will be required. So, certain criteria needs to be identified in order to decide on a policy related to sidewalks. Then, in areas where sidewalks will be required, where will they be placed (on the curb or set back from the curb), and how wide they will be if installed.

Councilman Hohenshelt asked staff to pull back up on the overhead screen the following, potential criteria for a sidewalks policy:

- 1. The street is above a residential/local classification or on the currently adopted Throughfare Plan (i.e. minor collector, major collector, minor arterial and major arterial)
- 2. If average daily traffic is 1,000 vehicles per day or more
- 3. If a portion of the block of the street is within 1,000 feet of a school, city park, or church, the entire block shall have a sidewalk.

He initially stated that his preference is to have one and two above *OR* three. Following some additional dialogue with Councilman Fowler, Hohenshelt went on to share that he believes the policy should be that if one, or two, or three exists, then sidewalks will be installed / required. Councilmember Macalik suggested that the 1,000 vehicles per day (on number two above) be lowered to 500 vehicles per day. Mayor Pruitt asked if traffic counts will be utilized based on today's traffic counts or if updated traffic counts will be used some years from now when actual bond projects are being addressed. Council seemed to generally agree to utilize the traffic counts "as is," as presented and identified today.

Mr. Crowley asked for some clarification from Council on if they'd like to see an updated map when the ordinance is brought back for consideration. Also, does the city's adopted Thoroughfare Plan need to be revisited to reclassify certain streets and the proposed roadway widths.

Councilman Trowbridge expressed a desire to include the sixteen block "Downtown District" in the policy to stipulate that "sidewalks are required." Councilman Johannesen pointed out that those streets are already covered under the provision that the street be within 1,000 feet of a school, city park or church.

Extensive dialogue continued to take place related to this proposed sidewalks policy.

Councilmember Hohenshelt made a motion to move forward with setting the city's sidewalk policy as follows:

- 1. The street is above a residential/local classification or on the currently adopted Thoroughfare Plan (i.e. minor collector, major collector, minor arterial and major arterial); AND
- 2. The average daily traffic is 750 vehicles per day or more; OR
- 3. A portion of the block of the street is within 1,000 feet of a school, city park, or church, then the entire block shall have a sidewalk.

Hohenshelt specified that the exact criteria related to how and where traffic counts will take place will be hammered out separately. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

Discussion then ensued pertaining to sidewalk width and the placement of the sidewalks (either abutted to the back of the curb or with a strip of grass in between the curb and the sidewalk).

Councilmember Hohenshelt moved to set the policy (for reconstruction projects – NOT for 'new subdivisions') at 6' wide sidewalks and that they be situated right abutted to the back of the curb. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which, following brief comments, passed unanimously.

2. MIS2019-001 - Discuss and consider approval of a resolution establishing a public hearing date for the consideration of an updated Land Use Assumptions, Capital Improvements Plan, and the adoption of Roadway, Water, and Wastewater Impact Fees, and take any action necessary.

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided brief comments. Councilman Hohenshelt moved to set the date for Oct. 21, 2019. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

3. Discuss and consider an **ordinance** approving a negotiated settlement between cities in the Atmos Cities Steering Committee and Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division regarding the 2019 Rate Review Mechanism filings, adopting tariffs as part of the settlement, and take any necessary action.

Assistant City Manager Joey Boyd provided brief background information concerning this agenda item. Following his brief comments, Councilmember Macalik moved to approve the ordinance as presented. Councilmember Hohenshelt seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

Mr. Phil Wagner came forth and shared that he has spoken with the city attorney, Mr. Garza, and it has

been suggested that one caveat be added to this ordinance between first and second reading. And that is

that parking permits would be issued for those vehicles that have no other option but to park for more

than 2-hours at a time (i.e. construction-related vehicles doing work in the area). Mayor Pruitt asked who would be issuing said permits. Mr. Crowley, City Manager, shared that the REDC staff would issue said permits on behalf of the city. Mayor Pruitt expressed concern and general disagreement with criminalizing parking and with empowering the REDC to issue the permits and decide who will and won't be criminalized. General discussion ensued pertaining to the fact that the original building occupant received a parking requirement variance; however, since that time, the original tenant is no longer there, and a new tenant is now occupying the facility. The new tenant operates a type of business that has many employees, whereas the original tenant operated a business that did not have a lot of employees. This is how and why the parking woes have emerged. General discussion ensued pertaining to enforcement. Mayor Pruitt strongly expressed opposition to making this a criminal matter when it is truly a civil matter. He does not mind making it a civil penalty; however, he has a problem utilizing our Police Department to enforce these parking limitations on a criminal basis. City Attorney Frank Garza provided brief comments, generally indicating that enforcing this two-hour parking limit will be very difficult to enforce. Also, he does understand the mayor's concerns pertaining to creating criminal penalties concerning this topic. That is why some cities have made it an 'administrative violation' rather than a 'criminal violation.'

Craig Renfro 1556 Parkside Circle Rockwall, TX

 Mr. Renfro, current Chairman of the REDC, came forth and shared his observations pertaining to the parking congestion in the area. He generally indicated that the parking congestion is causing potential business prospects to be dissuaded from signing contracts to locate their business(es) in the Tech Park because of the parking-related concerns. He seemed to reinforce Mr. Wagner's sentiments that some sort of remedy is most assuredly needed with regards to solving the parking-related concerns. It is viewed as negative by companies that visit from places like China and Germany.

General discussion ensued pertaining to civil versus criminal remedies associated with solving the parking concerns. Mr. Wagner mentioned that the property's deeds, covenants and restrictions do call for no 'on street' parking; however, he has concerns about taking a tenant to court and suing them (civilly) to get them to comply and remedy their parking problems.

Council generally asked the City Manager to go out to the Tech Park and speak with the tenant to explain to the tenant the parking-related remedies that the city *could* potentially institute if they are unable to get their own parking congestion under control.

So, Council took no formal action pertaining to this agenda item at this time.

The options considered by the group included the 26 27 following (along with associated budget estimates): 28 150' Flagpole with installation: \$57,750 170' Flagpole with installation: \$76,114 29 180' Flagpole with installation: \$98,340 30 195/200' Flagpole with installation: \$113,340 31 Mr. Boyd explained that the planning committee is seeking direction as to if the City Council approves of 32 the concept of the entry feature, a confirmation of the 3rd site being the preferred site, and 33 authorization to further study the site by performing a geotechnical study to get a soil report for base 34

design. Based on the geotechnical report, a structural engineering firm will perform foundation design

- and provide a rendering to submit to TXDOT for approval. The design will be performed and stamped by
- a structural engineer. The cost for the geotechnical study and report is \$3,500 and base design is \$1,200.
- In addition, an FAA Study will be required due to the location of the site being within 7 nautical miles of
- an airport. The study is free but can take up to 12 weeks to complete. This can be written authorization

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Mr. Wacker came forth and expressed concern about there not currently being sufficient impact fees to pay off the bonds for John King Blvd. He shared that he has calculated that his water bill will go out 29% in the next three years, and his wastewater bill will go up by about 70%. Staff indicated that this topic is concerning impact fees, not individual water / wastewater bills.

There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak during the public hearing, Mayor Pruitt then closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Trowbridge clarified his understanding that impact fees are related to outside developer contributions funding city roadway, water and wastewater improvements, essentially having developers bear the cost burden.

Councilmember Johannesen moved to approve the ordinance for MIS2019-001 as written. Following additional comments, Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion.

He encouraged the City to address this issue to rectify it. He thanked the Council for lowering the tax rate, sharing that the city portion of his tax bill did decrease for about \$10. Regarding impact fees, Mr. Wendt thanked Trowbridge for his comments at the last city council meeting. He feels the taxpayer was left out of the discussion at the last meeting. He pointed out that if impact fees are not paid for by developers, then the taxpayer has to pick up the cost. He shared the belief that, even if the council decides to go higher than what was previously discussed, it will not be heavily felt by / will not heavily impact the developer. He wonders what the impact of the Council's decision will ultimately be on tax payers. He urged Council to revisit this, bearing in mind the impact on the taxpayer.

Janice Morchower 144 Westwood Rockwall, TX 75032

Ms. Morchower spoke about the condos that are being built at The Harbor, which she pointed out are essentially apartments. She shared that she had a phone conversation with Mayor Pruitt a while back, and she is wondering if there are any updates regarding this forthcoming development. She wonders how this transitioned from individually deeded condominiums to 'apartments.' She also spoke briefly on impact fees, sharing that she supports impact fees and believes they should be higher on developers. She does not believe that the taxpayers should have to pay for new development. Mrs. Morchower spoke briefly about a building moratorium that will be on the agenda this evening. She understands that this will be a short moratorium and it will be in the ETJ. She believes a longer moratorium is ideal in order to allow time for infrastructure development to catch up with growth. She is specifically concerned about existing and worsening traffic congestion. She suggested that a couple of traffic lights be evaluated for their timing; however, the mayor pointed out that both signal lights she has pointed out are TXDOT owned and operated.

Council took no action pertaining to this agenda item.

3. Appointment with Scott Mommer of Lars, Anderson & Associates, Inc. on behalf of the Home Depot to discuss amending the Unified Development Code (UDC) to allow the "Rental, Sales, and Service of Heavy Machinery and Equipment" land use in the Commercial (C) District by a Specific Use Permit (SUP), and take any action necessary.

Jason Pyka 12225 Greenville Ave., Ste. 1000 Dallas, TX 75243

Mr. Pyka shared that he is appearing this evening on behalf of Mr. Mommer. Discussion took place pertaining to how much heavy equipment may be visible. Mr. Miller shared that the applicant will be required to build a masonry wall that is one foot higher than the equipment that is being screened. The applicant may request an alternate screening, which will consist of trees, shrubs and a wrought iron fence around it. This will be by the building expansion that will be at one end of the building and will be near 10 parking spaces.

The city attorney clarified that Council is deciding this evening whether or not to allow this type of use in a commercial district. If the council does decide to allow this use, then Home Depot would have to apply for an SUP thereafter and go through the standard SUP approval process.

Following the discussion, Councilmember Daniels moved to approve moving forward with amending the UDC to allow this land use. Mayor Pro Tem Macalik seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

X. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

Z2019-022 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider a request by Marty Wright for the approval of an ordinance for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) allowing an accessory building on a one

 acre tract of land identified as Lot 10, Block B, Saddlebrook Estates #2 Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Single-Family 16 (SF-16) District, addressed as 2340 Saddlebrook Lane, and take any action necessary (1st Reading).

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided background information concerning this agenda item. The applicant is requesting approval of a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for a detached garage that exceeds the maximum allowable size for properties located within a Single-Family 16 (SF-16) District. Currently situated on the subject property, there is a 3,397 SF brick single-family home and a 216 SF accessory building that is clad with wood. The proposed building will be situated behind the main structure, will be 13' 8" in height, and will be constructed of metal. The building will include a 24' x 40' (i.e. 960 SF) detached garage and a 6' x 40' (i.e. 240 SF) porch that will be on the front of the building. The total footprint of the building will be 1,200 SF (i.e. 35% of the size of the home). The porch will incorporate windows with shutters, double walk-in doors, and wooden posts. The applicant has stated that the purpose of the porch is to blend the building with the neighborhood by incorporating architectural elements that are typically seen on a single-family home. The building will have two (2) roll-up doors located on each of the side façades (i.e. north and south façades) and the applicant has stated that detached garage will be utilized to store several antique vehicles. The existing 12' x 18' (i.e. 216 SF) accessory building will be relocated and will be situated adjacent to the northern side façade of the proposed detached garage. The applicant has provided a site plan and proposed building elevations to be reviewed by the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Council. Thirty notices were sent out to adjacent property owners. Four emails and one notice in favor were received back, and 1 was received back in opposition. The Planning & Zoning Commission recommended denial of the applicant's request by a vote of 7-0.

Mayor Pruitt opened up the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak.

Mr. Givens came forth and spoke in favor of approval of this SUP.

Steve Griffin 2348 Saddlebrook Lane Rockwall, TX

Mr. Griffin spoke in favor of approval of this SUP.

Mr. Bob Wacker 309 Featherstone Rockwall, TX

Mr. Wacker came forth and generally spoke in favor of this item.

There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak, Mayor Pruitt then closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Fowler moved to approve Z2019-022. Mayor Pro Tem Macalik seconded the motion. The ordinance was read as follows:

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided background information pertaining to this agenda item.

Mayor Pruitt opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time.

Ms. Morchower came forth and said she is strongly in favor of this moratorium.

There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak, Mayor Pruitt then closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Trowbridge moved to approve the moratorium. Councilmember Fowler seconded the motion. Following brief discussion, the motion passed unanimously of those present.

Mr. Miller provided brief comments concerning this agenda item, indicating that this did not receive a unanimous approval at the last city council meeting. Hohenshelt proceeded to provide lengthy comments pertaining to this topic, generally indicating that there may be a misnomer that if impact fees are in place and adequate, then citizens' taxes will decrease. 3. Discuss and consider appointments to fill vacancies on the city's Airport Advisory Board, Historic Preservation Advisory Board, and Park Board, and take any action necessary.

Councilmember Johannesen moved to appoint Anna Dodd to the city's Park Board (to replace former member, Fran Webb). Mayor Pruitt seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

I. CALL PUBLIC MEETING TO ORDER (AND OPEN FORUM HELD)

Mayor Pruitt called the meeting to order at 3:02 p.m. Present were Mayor Jim Pruitt, Councilmembers Patrick Trowbridge, Kevin Fowler, Bennie Daniels and Trace Johannesen, City Manager Rick Crowley, and Assistant City Managers Joey Boyd and Mary Smith.

Mayor Pruitt indicated that an Open Forum would be held at this time, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak.

David Booth

Mr. Booth came forth and spoke, indicating that he just became aware of the item being considered today. He explained that his company has a residential development project in the ETJ that has been ongoing for about the past six months. A lot of consultants are working on the project. He went on to explain that in the ETJ, a developer does full blown engineering plans and goes straight to the 'final plat' stage. He shared that at a "pre-development meeting" that was held on Oct. 24 with city staff, a moratorium was not discussed or indicated at all, even though the city's discussions concerning imposing a moratorium started the next day, on Oct. 25. Mr. Booth went on to ask for an exception for his particular project, indicating that they will build their own water / sewer lines and streets. He explained that their project will not tie into any city streets, only state owned and maintained roads. He understands the reasoning for the moratorium; however, he does not believe his project will impact the City from the standpoint of maintenance and consumption of public facilities. Therefore, he would like to be able to continue his project, but this moratorium will really disrupt the process associated with his project. He shared that his project will abide by any / all City of Rockwall standards, which are all 'above and beyond' those that are in place in the county.

There being no one else wishing to come forth and speak, Mayor Pruitt closed the "Open Forum" / public input part of the meeting.

II. HOLD A PUBLIC HEARING TO DISCUSS AND CONSIDER APPROVAL OF AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING A MORATORIUM ON ACCEPTING AND REVIEWING SUBDIVISION PLATS FOR COMMERCIAL AND RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY SITUATED WITHIN THE CITY'S EXTRATERRITORIAL JURISDICTION (ETJ), AND TAKE ANY ACTION NECESSARY. (2ND READING)

Mayor Pruitt asked staff why 1.5 acre tracts are being exempted. Mr. Miller shared that the reason for this exemption is because those typically provide onsite sewage systems, and they don't pose issues for infrastructure. Anything larger than that, however, does impact infrastructure.

Mr. Miller indicated that, if they are required to subdivide, the city would review a property that does not create more than 2 lots, that each lot is greater than 1.5 acres and that they provide onsite sewage facilities. Mayor Pruitt expressed concern, indicating he does not understand why these types of properties should be exempted out.

Councilman Johannesen asked for staff to explain what a moratorium practically means. Mr. Miller shared that this particular moratorium only applies to the submission of plans/subdivision plat applications to the City for residential properties in the ETJ. This particular moratorium will be for 120 days. However, he pointed out that the Council does have the ability to possibly remove the moratorium sooner if the City signs an updated 'interlocal agreement' with the County to spell out how development(s) in the ETJ will be handled.

Mayor Pruitt moved to approve the ordinance imposing a moratorium, expressing that no properties will be exempted from the moratorium until the County gives the city plans regarding how subdivision plats and developments will be handled in the County (within the city's ETJ) so that it is fair to everyone concerned. Councilmember Daniels seconded the motion.

The ordinance was read as follows:

Mr. Bernas came forth and shared that, per the contract, there is a 3% cost of living increase annually. It was explained that, per the City Charter, the Council must fix the garbage rates by resolution. Following brief discussion, Councilmember Fowler moved to comply with the contract by adopting the proposed resolution setting the solid waste collection rates. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion. One, small needed change to the resolution was pointed out. The motion to approve the resolution with the small correction being made then passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Johannesen).

Discuss and consider an update regarding the Complete Count Committee for the U.S. 2020 Census and take any action necessary.

Councilman Daniels explained that this is a voluntary committee made up of representatives throughout the county and from the County itself. This committee has met two times so far. The purpose of the committee is to decrease the undercount of the census within Rockwall County. The objective is to have as complete a count as possible. Historically, we have had pretty good compliance; however, there is a certain tract of land that has traditionally been undercounted in each census. He explained that, in general, the undercounted area is in and around the Lake Rockwall Estates subdivision. The number one reason for undercounts is distrust of the government. He went on to explain that those who perform the Census are sworn to a strict, lifetime confidentiality Oath. He stressed that the Census is directly associated with Congressional representation, and that is very important to the State of Texas at the Federal government level. Last, the Census is very important because many Federal grants are given out based on population, and we want to be sure we get our fair share of those grant monies. He pointed out that jobs are available, part time, this summer for those who might be interested in working on the Census count.

Mr. Boyd, Assistant City Manager, provided follow up comments after Councilman Daniels spoke, sharing some of the upcoming expectations as far as 'next steps' associated with the Census. April 1 is Census Day, and the counts will be presented to the President of the U.S. on or before Dec. 31, 2020.

People will be able to participate in the Census by the internet, by phone, at a Census center, or in person (with a Census rep. showing up at one's door).

Council took no action pertaining to this agenda item.

3. Discuss and consider an update regarding the South Lakeshore/Summit Ridge reconstruction project, and take any action necessary.

Mayor Pruitt shared that this is the largest bond project to date, and we are 10 months into a 2 year long project. He explained that his neighbors recently met; however, they did not invite him to the meeting. The mayor explained that staff has met with him and provided him with the huge contracts associated with this bond project, and he has reviewed those. He shared that some residents have concerns that there are many days when it appears as though no construction work is taking place, or very little work and progress is being made. He believes that two years is a very long time for a neighborhood to be torn up. He believes that the city needs a better way of communicating with residents about what is going on with the progress of construction. Also, he believes that city notifications should be expanded beyond those who only live in that immediate area. He shared that the contractor is responsible for ensuring the roadways are passable and that potholes stay filled. The contractor is required to clean up the job sites every day (i.e. after it rains). He would like to see the City limit a project like this to about a year (rather than 2 years). Also, he thinks that incentives should be built into the contract to encourage contractors to finish the job(s) just as soon as possible. Discussion took place related to a subcontractor of the general contractor who was negligent and accidentally damaged the bridge deck by cutting through it. The bridge repair should take place sometime after the first of the year.

Council took no action pertaining to this agenda item.

4. Discuss and consider (re)appointments to the city's Historic Preservation Advisory Board and Main Street Advisory Board, and take any action necessary.

Councilman Trowbridge explained that our city's Main Street Advisory Board has been pretty solidly in place for the last ten years. Now, however, three people are rolling off due to term limits, and there is one person who is resigning due to time constraints. He mentioned that candidate Jennifer Hoffman needs to get registered to vote and that she is working on that now. So, pending her doing so, he'd like to recommend her along with a few other candidates. Mayor Pruitt then moved to appoint the following individuals to the city's Main Street Advisory Board: Stacy Fuqua, Craig Stoddart, Geoffrey Lyons and Jennifer Hoffman and also appoint Jennifer Hoffman to the Historic Preservation Advisory Board. Councilmember Trowbridge seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 ayes with 1 absence (Johannesen).

V. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

1. A2019-001 - Hold a public hearing to discuss and consider commencing annexation proceedings by petition per Chapter 43, Subchapter C-4 of the Texas Local Government Code for a 41.49-acre tract of land situated within the City of Rockwall's Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ), and generally located on the north side of Cornelius Road west of the intersection of Cornelius Road and Stodghill Road [FM-3549], and take any action necessary.

Planning Director Ryan Miller provided background information pertaining to this agenda item. On December 2, 2019, the City Council adopted *Resolution No. 19-27* directing staff to proceed with the annexation process for a ~41.49-acre tract of land adjacent to Cornelius Road. This direction came in response to a petition submitted on November 19, 2019 by Barbara Lee (*a resident in the ~41.49-acre tract of land*) indicating that a majority of the property owners in the annexation area supported annexation.

Miller explained that the next step in the annexation process is taking place this evening, which is for the City Council to hold a public hearing. In preparation for this public hearing and based on the annexation requirements outlined in Subchapter C-4, Annexation of Areas with Population of Less than 200 by Petition, of Chapter 43, Municipal Annexation, of the Texas Local Government Code, City staff sent a letter to all properties within the annexation area notifying the property owners of the time and date of the public hearing. Staff also included a copy of the Resolution No. 19-27 with the letter. This resolution outlines the City services that will be provided if the annexation effort is successful. Staff has included a copy of the letter that was sent out on December 4, 2019 in the City Council members' packets for review. It was noted that once this public hearing is complete, the following steps will need to be completed:

• January 2, 2020: 31-days after the resolution is adopted the municipality may start to collect signatures for the annexation petition from property owners within the annexation area.

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- May 30, 2020: 180-days after the resolution is adopted the window for the municipality to collect signatures from property owners within the annexation area ends. If the City obtains the number of signatures on the petition required to annex the area, the City may annex the area after notifying the residents and property owners of the results of the petition.
- June 1, 2020: The City Council will be required to hold a public hearing and the first reading of the annexation ordinance.
- June 15, 2020: The City Council will be required to hold a second public hearing and the second reading of the annexation ordinance.

Mayor Pruitt then opened the public hearing, asking if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time. Councilmember Patrick Trowbridge asked for confirmation that the City Council would not be taking any action at the meeting regarding this agenda item and this is the first meeting of the series. Mr. Miller noted that <u>no action</u> is required by the City Council at this meeting, <u>December 26</u>, 2019. Councilmember Kevin Fowler clearly stated that this request is prescribed very specifically by state law, and to meet the time requirements, the meeting was held on this date. Mr. Miller clarified that the City did not have a choice regarding tonight's meeting date, as state law mandated it.

- Forest W. Barton Jr. 1209 Marilyn Jayne (Lot #5)
- Mr. Barton came forth during the public hearing and stated he resides on lot #5. Mr. Barton thanked the Council for allowing us to come forth to offer our opinions regarding the annexation process. He stated he is in favor of the annexation and thinks it would be a good thing for the residents. Mr. Barton also stated there are a couple of questions/concerns that need to be addressed as this goes forward. Mr. Barton stated that number one is the County is in the process of replacing the street (Marilyn Jane). They replaced from areas starting with lot #2 and then down to the beginning of lot #5 which is his property. That was last year. This year they will continue with the areas from lot #5 down to lot #7, and next year - in theory - they were going to complete the rest of street, and then come back around to the circle. Mr. Barton stated this project would need to be addressed at some time. Mr. Barton stared he did not know if the County has put it on hold and if they are going to continue with it. Mayor Pruitt stated he would ask the county about that question before they continue this project. Mr. Barton stated there were several other concerns. One is that they all on septic systems and it would be nice for the City to be in position at some point to bring a sewer system into that area. It would be a great benefit to everyone and much appreciated. Mr. Barton stated he did not know if there were any plans for that process in the future. Mr. Barton wonders if that could possibly be a target down the road. Mr. Barton stated another main thing as we progress with this process is residents would like to have their area upgraded as much as possible. He expressed that the residents understand that some things are grandfathered in and will be things that are not going to fall under that purview. Mr. Barton is not sure how to determine what falls under the grandfathered clause, what is limited, and what is not going to be subjected to it at all. Mr. Barton stated he did not know how to locate this kind of information. Mr. Barton stated that as we progress thru this process he does realize that residents petitioning for annexation is the first step at getting there, and hopes that the City can address these items to allow residents to kind of get a feeling for where this is going and how it is going to be approached.

Councilmember Patrick Trowbridge stated that one of items that was brought up was the service agreement. Councilmember Patrick Trowbridge stated he wanted to know what it is, and has it been executed? He also asked what was in it - what city services are included in it? Mr. Miller stated the service agreement along with the resolution, which contained the lists/schedules of City Services that will be provided once the annexation is successful. He pointed out that it was presented at the 12.02.19 City Council meeting. That information was also included in the mailer that sent to residents dated December 4, 2019. Mr. Miller stated that currently the City does not have any hard services, which includes sewer, and the City currently does not serve water out there because it is in the Mount Zion water district. Once the City services are extended out there, they would have the ability to tie into to those. Mr. Miller stated that all soft services such as code enforcement, planning & zoning, trash, building inspections, animal control would immediately be available once the annexation is complete. Councilmember Patrick Trowbridge asked for further clarification, and Mr. Miller stated that services will include police and fire service. Councilmember Patrick Trowbridge also asked if they would still be under the same water district and Mr. Miller stated yes.
