### City of Rockwall's "Old Rusty" Water Tower Dismantled

The City of Rockwall's water tower on Boydstun Avenue (next to Fire Station One), nicknamed "Old Rusty" by some on social media, is being dismantled. The water storage tank was constructed in 1978, and served its purpose for 30 years, when it was taken offline in 2008.

To take its place, newer water towers were constructed at North Country Lane and Interstate 30 to meet demand. As the city grew, the need for greater capacity and higher elevations made the Boydstun water tower inefficient and ultimately obsolete as a water source.

However, in the years since it was decommissioned, the structure's purpose evolved from a water source to a revenue source—with telecommunications and broadband providers located on the tank. Then the time finally came when the tower either needed to be resurfaced and painted or deconstructed. Over the past few months, the cell providers have been relocated to the radio tower adjacent to the water tower in preparation for the dismantling.



It will take approximately 30 days to dismantle the water tower. The process includes using a cutting torch to cut the water tower into smaller pieces and lowering them to the ground, working from the top down. Watch for regular updates and pictures of the process as it happens.

## Love Your Landscape... Prepare Your Lawn for Fall

Believe it or not, fall is around the corner. September is the time of year you need to be ready to apply your preemergents for winter weed prevention. This way you do not have to fight weeds in your dormant Bermuda grass all winter.

Apply your pre-emergents no later than October 15, and water thoroughly. Always read the label and follow the label exactly.

This will also be the month you apply your final application of fertilizer for landscape and grass. This is the most important application to help your landscape prepare for winter. A balanced fertilizer such as 20-5-10 or a ratio close to this are best for this final application.
